Miss Keefer Arrested at Strathroy—Her Religious Title.

Niagara Falls, Ont., Oct. 8.—Chief Mains brought back this afternoon Margaret Keefer, better known as Sister Magdalen, charged with stealing the seven-month-old son of Mary Bowen, a domestic of Port Erie. Sister Magdalen was situated at the house of Mrs. Corry, Strathroy, where the child was traced from Fort Erie after being stolen on Sept. 25, and restored to its mother after being in the hands of Sister Magdalen about ten days in her travels around Glenora, Mount Brydges, Komoka and Strathroy.

THE WOMAN ARRESTED.
Sister Magdalen was placed in the lock-up here and was behind the bars when seen this evening, attired in nun's black garments, with large silver crosses on a chain hanging at her waist. She claims she is a sister of the Order of Bethany, attached to the English Church, and has been in the order for seven years. The woman claims ignorance of doing anything contrary to the law.

The authorities feel that the woman had some motive in stealing the child, probably for the purpose of making contributions, as they know she has carried on a large mail correspondence, receiving letters addressed to "Sister Magdalen, Mother Superior of Order of Nazareth," and other titles.

The woman will be brought before P. M. Col. Cruikshank in the morning and will probably be remanded to get information of what life she has been living.

BOY WITH A BROOM THREW TROLLEY FROM THE RAILS

Among the passengers was a Mrs. Noxon, of 267 Dundas street, who has been in the city but a short time, coming from Toronto here. She had with her a babe in arms and a pretty little golden-haired tot of about 3 years. She managed to keep hold of the babe and the little girl until the last lurk, and this proved too much, and the child was hurled against the floor of the car with great force. The little girl sustained a badly cut mouth, her teeth penetrating the nether lip, and when carried to the car into a store, the bosom of her neat white frock was crimson with blood. She was hysterical for some time from the shock and fright, and when taken home by her mother appeared to have quite recovered, except from the cut in her lip.

Mrs. Noxon said it all happened so quickly she did not have much time to observe what was going on, but she did not think the car was going very fast when the accident occurred. All she remembered was holding onto her babies, and seeing the people hurrying out of the car as the trolley was jolted along over the tracks. The accident furnished Londoners with the unique sight of one car carrying both tracks. Before the wrecker came, the motorman turned on the current, and the car moved up and down on both lines. The wrecker righted the trolley in about half an hour.

Just before this accident occurred, the wires broke at the corner of London and Adelaide street, and the system was tied up for an hour, so that between both accidents the street cars on a majority of the lines were not running for about an hour and a half of the afternoon. Between 5 and 6 o'clock, however, the wires were left the tracks in the east car, and was not righted for some time.

BOARD OF WORKS BOWLED MR. McMECHAN OUT AGAIN

On an autumn evening, when the crickets are out enjoying life, too, it is very interesting to be able to tell the temperature of the air by the number of chirps the cricket makes per minute.

It seems that the rate of chirps is affected by the temperature, and the exact relation of the temperature to the number of chirps have been estimated. With a little care in counting, one soon becomes expert enough to tell the temperature within one or two degrees Fahrenheit.

One meets with many discouragements at first as he tries hard to count every chirp, or the cricket stops before the minute is up; other insects' notes drown out the crickets; the noise of passing vehicles, etc., are very apt to interrupt at the critical moment of counting. But a little patience will easily overcome such difficulties.

When one has the average number of chirps per minute, take one-fourth of that number and add forty to that result will be the temperature within a degree or two of the actual temperature as read from a thermometer hung out of doors.

Another experiment is to capture a cricket and take him into the house, and see how much faster he chirps when he is warm.

To count the chirps per minute, taking one-fourth of that number, and adding forty to it, may seem a little complicated—but it is really very simple, and is like the game. "Think of a number, and double it," put to an interesting purpose.

Chairman Wyatt—Despite all that has been said, I think Mr. McMechan should be heard."

Ald. Gerry—So do I. Put it to a vote. We've had enough of him already."

Mr. McMechan further informed the committee at this stage that he asked as a citizen on behalf of a committee of citizens, to be heard, but the mayor said he wasn't aware that Mr. McMechan represented anybody.

The discussion was continued for some time and then the chairman took the vote, and the result was that Mr. McMechan lost, Chairman Wyatt and Ald. Gerry voting to hear him, and the mayor, Ald. Cooper and Ald. Abram voting nay.

Mr. McMechan had wanted the vote and proceeded to address the committee, which act had the effect upon Ald. Cooper that a red rag has upon a bull.
