SEEKING AN INJUNCTION

To Stop Importing of American Re-
prints of Encyclopaedia.

Ottawa, Nov. 25.—The Imperial vs.
Black was before the Supreme Court
recently.

The applicants for a long time have
been importing into Canada American
reprints of the Encyclopaedia Britanica
(9th ed.), of which respondents
claim to own the copyright, and the
latter sued for an injunction against
such importation, delivery to them of
all copies so imported in appellant's
possession, an account of sales and for
damages.

The question to be decided on this
appeal is whether or not, there being
imperial legislation prohibiting foreign
reprints of British copyrights in Brit-
ish possessions, the Parliament of Can-
ada has the power under the B. N. A.
Act to repeat the same so far as Can-
ada is concerned, and if it has such
power whether or not it has been
exercised.

The judge held that the Imperial act
is not in force in Canada. The Court
of Appeal reversed his decision, two
of their lordships dissenting. Ramey
and Hales appeared for the appellant.
Barwick, K.C., and J. Moss for the re-
spondent.

ity the details of the bill of public
worship as drawn up by the Govern-

RECIAT AT THE AUDITORIUM

A DELIGHT TO MUSIC LOVERS

**The Dwight-Edwards Recital En-
joyed by a Large Audience**

—An Artistic Programme.

It is safe to say that it is seldom
the music lovers of this city have such
a treat as they enjoyed last night. It
had been anticipated that the recital
given by Mr. Cyril Dwight-Edwards
and Mr. Harry Field would be some-
thing distinctly above the ordinary,
and it was not disappointed. The pro-
gramme was a most artistic and in-
teresting one. The recital began at
8:20 o'clock. That the audience was
critical and appreciative, as well as
enthusiastic, was evident from the at-
tention with which every number was
listened to, and the generous share of
applause which each number received.
As one of his acceptances Mr. Dwight-
Edwards sang the "Irish Colleen" in a

Italian added an additional charm to
the songs themselves. Mr. Dwight-
Edwards probably sang a more diffi-
cult programme last night than he has
before in this city, and the music
lovers' opinion of his powers probably
rose to even a higher degree than be-
fore.

In the rendition of "Alla Belloa Con-
tente" (accompanying Mr. Ernest E. Cote
assisted Mr. Wheeler with a violin
obligato in a very capable manner.

The readings from well-known poets
by Miss Wynne Logan made a most
pleasing variation from the rest of the
programme. Arnold's "With Sa'di in
the Garden" was particularly pleas-
ing. Miss Logan was a magnetic per-
sonality, in addition to the tempera-
ment of an artist, and had the hearts
of her hearers won by the very start. Her
reading showed the results of careful
study and a true appreciation of lit-
erature. Her manner was totally free
from the "loudness" which often char-
acterizes the performance of elocution-
ists who have had an American train-
ing.
