

PRESERVATION OF FORESTS

Ontario Government May Adopt Radical Measures for Reforestation.

Toronto, March 9.—It is understood that Hon. Frank Cochrane, minister of lands, forests and mines, has under consideration a comprehensive plan for the preservation of Ontario's forests and reforestation.

The plan is believed to be a radical and extensive one, under which the crown will secure the return of hundreds of acres of forest now held by licensees in the northern portion of the province and will arrange for the taking over of tracts of land in Ontario capable of growing white pine in perpetuity.

It will be remembered that in his recent address the prime minister, Hon. Mr. Whitney, intimated that in the near future the Government proposed an official tackling of the forestry problem. This, it is learned, has been under the attention of the minister of lands, forests and mines for some months, and that Hon. Mr. Cochrane will recommend many important advances along the lines of conserving the forest wealth of the province. His plans are contemplated a reorganization of the whole existing system.

United States manufacturers have been turning covetous eyes towards Canadian forests, and the minister proposes to put the timber laws of this province in a condition to effectually prevent their depletion.

Hon. Mr. Cochrane's proposals are believed to be comprehensive and far-reaching. They will extend over several years. A start will be made at the present session of the Legislature, when the minister will put through a bill taking power by legislation to sell matured timber on forest reserves under special regulations calling for great care in the handling of the debris. A qualified forester and government ranger will indicate the trees to be cut, as where pine reaches a certain stage it goes back and should be taken out on maturity.

The estimates provide the extra sum of \$45,000 for fire and forest ranging and forest reserve, and the most rigorous care is to be taken on all work.

Following this, it is probable that the Government will take up the question of the old licensees, all granted prior to 1932, giving the right to cut all the timber. The Government will undertake, where possible, to get rid of these licensees and reinvest the property in the crown on an equitable basis, either by allowing the licensees a certain time to cut timber of a certain size or by settling with them forthwith.

Another feature of Hon. Mr. Cochrane's plan, it is understood, is to effect arrangements by which the province will take over certain tracts of land in older Ontario, where the sandy soil makes for forestry rather than agricultural development, and such as are now growing young white pine, with a view to handling them scientifically to maintain the forests in perpetuity.

COULD NOT CASH CHECK

Indicted Financier Had \$30 Check Returned—Wife Also Refused.

New York, March 9.—Charles W. Morse, late head of the "trust," and a leading financier, under indictment, was unable to get a check cashed, which he received on Saturday. Finally he gave the check to his wife, to be deposited in her own bank. She handed it to the receiving teller, who handed it back to her with a smile, remarking that it would be unsafe to leave it in the bank, since it might be seized under the attachment.

Mr. Morse told this story yesterday as an illustration of the plight in which he has been placed. He is, he said, unable to deposit any money in any institution in the city with any reasonable hope of getting it out again.

ARMED DEPUTIES GUARD MURDERER

Anarchist Slayer of Denver Priest Protected From Mob Violence.

Denver, March 9.—Anticipating the presence of a large crowd at the opening of the trial today of Giuseppe Alia, the Syrian, who, in cold blood, murdered Father Leo Heinrichs, of St. Elizabeth's Church, while he was giving the sacraments on Sunday, Feb. 23, Sheriff Alexander Nisbet had stationed deputies along the walls, and in the entrance ways leading from the jail to the courtroom, and also in the courtroom itself. This precaution was taken to frustrate any attempt at mob violence, although the authorities do not look for any real outbreak of this kind.

Alia's case was the first on the criminal docket, and Judge Whitford, who is taking his turn on the criminal bench, had ordered present an open panel of 100 veniremen.

It was expected that the defense of Attorney Widdicombe, representing Alia by appointment of the court, would be largely guesswork. In the hope of saving the life of his client, and to be prepared for combating this defense the prosecution had summoned eight of the most skillful brain specialists in the city to be present, for the purpose of observing the defendant, and thus be in readiness to give expert opinion as to his sanity. The defense had arranged also for three alienists to serve their side.

When Alia was taken from the jail to the courthouse he was under the guard of Sheriff Nisbet and four deputies, each armed with a brace of revolvers. His men had explicit instructions to keep the jail ground clear of and to arrest anyone who showed any evidence of intention to attack the prisoner. Spectators in the courtroom were closely scrutinized and all suspicious characters were excluded from the building.

THE BY-ELECTIONS FOR SIX MONTHS

Liberals Were Elected in Six and Conservatives in Three.

Ottawa, March 9.—A return of by-elections for the Commons held during 1935, issued yesterday in blue book form, show that during the year fourteen by-elections were held. Of these, five were by acclamation, the members elected being all Liberals, namely: Hon. Wm. Pugsley, Hon. Geo. P. Graham, Hon. Jacques Bureau, Pius Michaud, (Victoria, N. B.), and C. Major (Lafayette). In the nine contested constituencies Liberals were elected in six and Conservatives in three. The aggregate Liberal majorities totalled 5,318, and the aggregate Conservative majorities 1,590, to which Major Beattie's majority in London against the Labor candidate contributed 1,935.

DECISION FOR SCHMITZ.

San Francisco, March 9.—That former Mayor Eugene E. Schmitz was unlawfully convicted of extortion and sentenced to five years in prison was reaffirmed today by the state supreme court.

Today's decision also applies to Abraham Ruef. It is believed that Schmitz and Ruef will immediately apply for release from the county jail on bail.

The prosecution purposes at once to bring to trial some of the many other charges preferred against them.

ANOTHER SPECIAL MESSAGE AT HAND

A Rumor Current in Washington of More Trouble Brewing.

Washington, March 9.—There is more trouble ahead for the country, according to rumor current at the Capitol today. Word was brought from the White House that the President is displeased because Congress has not acted on the recommendations in his special message that startled the country recently. It was said that he intended to express his displeasure very soon in another special message that will make the Capitol windows ring and give renewed impetus to the talk of a "second elective term."

Republican senators who were willing to discuss the prospective message today admitted that they had received an intimation that it was under way, and would "sizzle," but seemed to be at a loss to account for the occasion for it. They agreed that the principal effect of such a document, aside from the effect it might have upon financial and industrial conditions, would be to fan the "second elective term" sparks.

There are many evidences, aside from the impending special message which the President is said to intend to administer to Congress, that the "second elective term" idea is working. Senator Jonathan Bourne, of Oregon, was very optimistic today in discussing the outlook. He intimated that he had perceived certain disadvantages in a brass band campaign and that he would not be so hasty as to move cautiously toward the attainment of his political ends—the routing of the country to the "second elective term" idea. The work now under way will go on. Senator Bourne said that the movement would be sufficiently pronounced in two or three weeks to impress the country with the specter of a few weeks of "second elective term" idea.

Up to this time the symptoms of the movement have been manifest mainly in the West, where the intermountain and Pacific coast states. In Wisconsin and Michigan the "second elective term" idea is subsiding, and may come to a halt. The work now under way will go on.
