Car Fell on the Horses.

A heavy refrigerator car tumbled over on one end of the car containing the horses with their keepers. One young fellow, a mere boy, who was sleeping in this end of the car with the horses, died on being taken out of the wreck, and the other, who was sermuch of the wreck.
