The Labor candidate in South Toronto, Mr. J. G. O'Donoghue, has received a letter from Mr. Goldwin of the I. O. F. Yours sincerely,

"Though on public questions I, like my fellow-citizens, take my side, I tative of the interests of labor. You appear to be such, and therefore, whether we are agreed or not on special questions, you command my sympathy and best wishes."

The eminent scholar, who played a great part in extending the bounds of political equality in the old land, has consistently argued in favor of giving parliamentary representation to the working classes as a matter of right and justice, and as an amelioration of social unrest and discontent. The conditions which have bred working-class parties in Europe are not reproduced in America to nearly the same extent and degree, but the aspiration of the workingmen of Canada to a share of political influence is a just and reason-

There was only one Labor member in the last Canadian House of Commons. There are not more than half a dozen Labor candidates in the present election. Even if they were all elected the workingmen would be very feebly represented, numerically speaking, as compared with other classes. They could bring their ideas prominently before Parliament and public, and hasten the adoption of measures which they could demonstrate to be useful and needful. The mass of labor legislation inscribed on the statute book in recent years shows that the Government is willing to be convinced.

In brief, the Liberal party is committed to a competitive tariff, and the Conservative party to a prohibitory tariff. The Opposition's policy is a negation of the preferential idea.
