REV. MR. DUXBURY

ATTRACTS CROWDS

Large Audiences Heard Him in First Methodist Church and the Auditorium.

SOME SERMONS SUNDAY

Condensations of Addresses Delivered by Pastors in Many Local Pulpits.

Rev. John Duxbury, of Manchester, England, conducted the services in the First Methodist Church yesterday, and in the morning, enlivened scenes from the life of Job. In the evening he recited in a dramatic manner the story of Joseph.

At both the morning and evening services the church would not hold the crowd that gathered, and many were turned away. There was a big audience at the Auditorium in the afternoon yesterday, when Professor Duxbury recited "A Waterloo Veteran," the story being that of Gregory Brewster, taken from Conan Doyle's "Around the Red Lamp." As a special encore, Professor Duxbury recited Edgar Allan Poe's poem, "The Bells."

Some Sermons.

Rev. J. G. Inkster, at the First Presbyterian Church, "There are ever so many decent people in our churches today, who have received every grace but one, they have received the grace of faith, of prayer, and of eloquence, but have not yet received the grace of generosity. It seems the last thing many Christians learn is to give. We praise the widow who gave her mite, but judge the rich man for not giving more. Let us praise the widow, but not blame the rich man. It is extremely hard to learn to give liberally."

First Congregational Church.

At the First Congregational Church on Sunday night the Rev. Ernest Peatfield continued his series of sermons on "The Mysteries of the Book of Revelations." The topic was "The Seventh Trumpet Angel, or the Angel of Judgment." "The greatest sin a man can be capable of is the utter rejection of God's love," said the Rev. Mr. Peatfield. "Every man will be judged according to his chances, and the heathen will be judged according to their slender opportunities. The purpose of the final judgment is that all shall be gathered together and God's justice and government through the centuries shall be vindicated. The good shall live with God, while the evil shall be banished to a second death. As we live so shall we die, and as we die so shall judgment be passed."

Memorial Church.

The Rev. Dyer H. H. of the Memorial Church, preached on Sunday morning on "Peter as a Rock." The central theme was that Peter was the prime apostle, and the one who laid the foundation of the church, and the honor of confessing Christ as the Son of God, thereby laying the foundation of the church of Christ. The evening topic was "The Twelve Apostles."

Colborne Street Church.

Rev. F. E. Malott, at the Colborne Street Methodist Church: "We are too often inclined to put our faith in temporal things, and human strength as long as everything is going all right. But times will come in our lives as they have in the lives of other men, when we lose our health, our friends, our hope which sustained us when we were strong is gone. That is the time when God alone can give us strength and strengthens us in every way."

Chalmers Church.

"Christ at Bethany" was the subject of Rev. Walter Moffatt's sermon at Chalmers Church on Sunday evening. He sketched the characters of Mary, Martha and Lazarus; Mary, sitting at the feet of Christ; Martha, and her trouble about many things; and Lazarus, the friend of Jesus. Although Jesus loved them sincerely, sickness and death came. This seems mysterious, and they send for the Master, but He comes not. His delay, however, was wisely timed in order that he might teach higher and grander truths concerning himself, in that He is the resurrection and the life.

Empress Avenue Church.

Rev. George Dewey, at Empress Avenue Church: "Do not feel hardly toward the poor fellow you see staggering from the saloon. He does not drink because he likes liquor, but to drown the memories that he has of his better self, and what he might have been."
