


## A CABLEGRAM FROM THE KING

His Majesty, George V., Sends a Message to Eucharistic Congress.

## A COURTEOUS GREETING

Great Gathering of Church Dignitaries Presents a Scene of Pomp and Splendor.

Montreal, Sept. 7.—A cablegram was received by Archbishop Bruchesi, Metropolitan of Montreal, from King George V. yesterday afternoon, but the newspapermen could not get any information as to its contents, before the opening of the Eucharistic Congress in St. James' Cathedral at 8 o'clock last night.

The twenty-first Eucharistic Congress (the first ever held on this continent), presented a grand spectacle, when the bishops and archbishops, headed by Cardinal Vannutelli, the pontifical Cardinal Legate, Cardinal Bruchesi, and the archbishop of the palace and coming out to Palace street, entered the cathedral from Dorchester, and proceeded to their respective places in front of the altar railing, the cardinal and the head officers of the congress occupying the leading places. The great cathedral was packed to the doors.

Cardinal Vannutelli, in his opening address, stated that in future these congresses would alternate between the old and new world. An important feature was the reading of a cable to the King, and his majesty's reply:

"Montreal, Sept. 5.—To His Majesty King George V., London: The Catholics of the empire, bishops, priests and laity present at the international eucharistic congress in Montreal pray your majesty to accept their respectful homage of unserving loyalty and their expression of profound gratitude for the medicinal and spiritual aid which you have given them and the other visiting members of the congress, hailing from all parts of the world, with your majesty and the royal family continued happiness and prosperity. Cardinal Vincenzo Vannutelli."

The King's Message. "Baltimore, Sept. 5.—His Eminence Cardinal Vannutelli, Montreal: I sincerely thank your majesty and all who are present at the international eucharistic congress in Montreal for the expressions of loyalty and good wishes contained in the telegram which I have received today with much pleasure and satisfaction."

Cable From Rome. In answer to a cablegram to the holy father, the cardinal secretary of state sent the following:

"Cardinal Vincenzo Vannutelli, Montreal, Canada. The holy father, profoundly touched by such sentiments expressed by the countless pilgrims to the congress from the countries of the old and new world, of 120 bishops, and the large number of priests surrounding your eminence, offers sublime universal homage of faith, and love to Jesus and the eucharist, at the first international eucharistic congress held on the continent of America, joins with lively joy and emotion of the splendid manifestations of admirable piety, union and devotion of the Government, city, and Canadian people with the religious authorities, and most cordially with the congressionists during these touching solemnities and praying the abundance of His favor upon the people and the laborers who are with us, and all the steam with fervent faith his apostolic benedictions. Cardinal Merry Del Val."

Archbishop Bruchesi replied to the Legate's address, and the ceremony closed with a short service.

## THE CITY COUNCIL EXTENDS SYMPATHY

Resolution Passed Over Death of the Water Commission Chairman.

At the meeting of the city council last night a resolution of sympathy was passed to the family of the late Adam T. McMahon, chairman of the water commissioners.

As soon as the council organized, Ald. Fitzgerald moved the following resolution:

"Whereas the council of the corporation of the city of London has been informed of the death of Adam T. McMahon, chairman of the water commissioners, and whereas Adam T. McMahon has for a number of years given faithful service on the court of regulation, and in 1910 discharged the arduous duties of chairman of the board of water commissioners of the city of London, with honor to himself and credit to the board;

"Be it resolved, that the council of the corporation spread on its minutes this record of the high esteem and appreciation of the faithful services of the late Adam T. McMahon in the interests of the city;

"Be it further resolved, that the council instruct the city clerk to forward to the bereaved family, the sympathy of the council in their sad bereavement, and insert in the minutes a copy of this resolution."

Ald. Jeffries seconded the motion, and in reply a standing vote.

Ald. Underwood then moved that the council attend the funeral in a body, and this was agreed to.

## CANADA BOUNDARY DISPUTE SETTLED

Treaty Settling It Made Effective by Signature of Taft.

Washington, Sept. 6.—Before leaving Beverly, President Taft signed a proclamation making effective the recent treaty between the United States and Great Britain settling the northeastern boundary dispute. The text of the proclamation has been made public at the state department. The new treaty was signed in Washington on May 21 last by the Right Hon. James Bryce, British ambassador to the United States, and Secretary of State Knox. Ratifications were exchanged here on Aug. 20 last.

The treaty defines the boundary line between the United States and Canada as beginning from a point in Passamaquoddy Bay lying between Treaty Island and Friar Head and extending thence through Passamaquoddy Bay and to the middle of Grand Manan Channel.

The treaty of April 11, 1908, under which the agreement was reached, provided for the submission of the dispute to arbitration in case it was impossible to reach an adjustment by direct negotiation. Secretary Knox and Ambassador Bryce reached a direct agreement on the subject, however, and it was not necessary to resort to arbitration.

## RAILROAD STRIKE SPREADS

Brotherhood of Carmen Say 5,000 Men Are Out in Texas.

Galveston, Texas, Sept. 7.—The strike of the Brotherhood of Railway Carmen on the Southern Pacific, which was inaugurated last night, is spreading to the Gould lines in the southwest. The strikers include car painters, checkers and inspectors on all lines of the Southern Pacific from New Orleans to El Paso.

One thousand men are out, according to the railroad officials, while the brotherhood officers say more than three thousand are on strike. Considerable delay in freight traffic has occurred, and the loss is heavy because cotton shipments are moving by the railroads, and it is important to get the cotton to port.

It is announced that the brotherhood men on the International and Great Northern and Texas and Pacific have quit, swelling the number who are handling a working contract with the roads and slight increase in pay to about five thousand.

## MISS HOBSON DEAD

Second Victim of the Auto Accident on Hamilton Mountain.

Hamilton, Sept. 6.—Miss Dorothy Hobson, who was injured in an automobile wreck two months ago, is dead.

Miss Perkins, a trained nurse, formerly of this city, was with Miss Hobson at the time of the accident, and was instantly killed.

Miss Theodora Josephine Frankens, the blind student at the University of Chicago, who, as an honorary distinction, was elected to the Phi Beta Kappa Society last year, received at the convocation of the university in June the degree of Latin and German.



## REVEAL SOUL BY NEW MIND DEVICE

Peep Into Eternity Possible by Photos of Brains.

## THOUGHTS ON SCREEN

Dr. Max Bafl Asserts Discovery Will Aid Reconstruction of Criminals.

Boston, Mass., Sept. 7.—Material revelation of the human soul, the activities and substance of which have baffled since the world began, is now at hand, declare those who have knowledge of the apparatus being perfected by a Buenos Ayres scientist which, by a combination of the X-ray, extreme magnifying and a cinematograph, will reproduce the processes of thought.

Not only will it be possible to see the methods by which the living reach conclusions, decide their duty acts, plot and scheme, but a peep may for a moment be taken into the hereafter, and something of the soul in its moment of flight into eternity be seen.

So said Dr. Max Bafl, fellow of psychology at Clark University, in Worcester today. It is Dr. Bafl who is co-operating with the South American scientist in the perfection of his apparatus. One of the brain, and in fact any organ of the body desired, can be magnified five thousand times by the device, which is to be attached to the X-ray apparatus, and then in the cinematograph to a moving picture screen (the disclosures are made). Light will be thrown on the problems of crime by this new achievement, believes Dr. Bafl. A man's mental picture may be measured to a nicety. And the mystery of the two great extremes in the mental scale, the brain of the genius and the brain of the fool, will be solved.

Locate Thought Area. "It is as if a new continent had been discovered," he says. "The exact place in the brain area where thought takes place is not yet known. By this moving picture the picture will be solved, I believe. Once we study the movement of the brain cells magnified five thousand times we will be able to trace the exact path of a man's mind, and whether or not it is fitted for the work that he is doing."

By these means science will be able to discriminate as to the fit and unfit mind, and on the other hand, we shall be able to detect the criminal who is plotting insanity, for brain-storms, in that they are a definite mental phenomenon, and photographed.

"How could the soul be projected on the screen? This would be interesting. Pictures might be taken at the moment of death and immediately after. It is believed that when the heart stops beating the soul leaves the body. Something may be learned of the soul by observing the changes in its habitat, the marvellous brain, at the moment when life ceases."

"The device which will magnify the brain cells is studying roses by the name of 'quintant' lanterns, in other words, that which can magnify five thousand times. The soul of the brain, in other words, they are called, are very tiny, you know. Before studying them, the scientist must magnify them tremendously. With this invention these infinitesimal pictures will be able to measure at two thousand times their normal size. It will be as if a person were to watch the motions of an ant enlarged to the size of a rat."
