Toronto, Nov I.—"Shall it be prohibition and abolition of bilingual schools?" This was the subject under discussion for hours at a meeting of the resolutions committee of the Reform Association of Ontario this morning in connection with preparing the platform for the coming campaign. The committee adjourned for luncheon at 1 o'clock, all the members keeping absolute silence as to the issue, which is not decided. It is understood that the minor planks as already published were adopted.

Toronto, Nov. I.—Under the chairmanship of thon, W. L. Mackenzie King, the committee on resolutions of the Ontario Reform Association held a private meeting at 10 o'clock this morning to decide on the provincial Liberal platform for the coming campaign. This committee has been vested with power by the general meeting of the Ontario Reform Association to make prohibition the principal plank in the platform if it is considered opportune. It is understood Leader Rowell is anxious to learn their actitude on that policy.

Toronto, Nov. 1.—After a wait which lasted all foreucon, the ommittee on resolutions of the Ontario Reform Association adousted for lunch without being able to confer with N. W. Rowell, C., the new leader. It was not Mr. Rowell's fault. He is enaged in court on a long case which will take him most of this ceek.

A Progressive Policy

Enumerators who were engaged I taking the census in this city have received sheets from the department of tawa asking that a great many con-Ottawa asking that a second rections be made, and as a result much dissatisfaction is evidenced. Some time ago the enumerators received checks for about 90 per cent of their bills, but the remainder was retained until the work was accepted by the census department as satisfactors.

It is claimed that the "corrections and omission" work will require much more time than the balance of the accounts is worth, and that errors in the checking at Ottawa are resulting in the greatest inconvenience to the enumerators.

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An Arduous Task.

The sheets returned bear the names of those whose records were taken improperly, crosses being placed in the columns which must be enumerated again. The original schedules are not returned and for this reason the checking by the enumerators has become an arduous task. The chief difficulty concerns the number of months spent at school by children.

The enumerators allege that they were instructed to till in this column only for the purpose of obtaining information concerning education in classes above the public schools, and as a result the matter was dealt with only in connection with those attending high schools or institutions where a fee is charged.


