"Times Change: Do We Change With Them?" asked Dr. George H. Locke, public librarian, of Toronto, in an able and interesting address before the Women's Canadian Club at the Normal School on Friday afternoon.

"New occasions bring new duties," said Dr. Locke, 'but are we meeting these new duties? The old idea was formerly held that this present life was merely a preparation stage for an ani-important life that followed But more recently we are coming to realize the full importance of the life today. Life is a process, an evolution, individuals are not born for certain employments, Men's intellectual equipments are about equal, but their emotional responsiveness varies slightly. Men are born to a certain profession only when they take the greatest possible interest in their work.

"The call to service today in Canada has never been equalled in any land at any time. The interdependence of individuals is becoming more and more intensified as a result of the progress of science and invention. Today, a single accident may cut off light and water from an entire city.

Woman's Work.

Dr. Locke then told of the good work done in Chicago, Toronto, and elsewhere by women's clubs and organizations. Jane Adams and the Hull House settlement were cited in particular, It was the mission of women's clubs to make the world keep pace socially, progress in science, invention and other lines. No government is strong enough to withstand the influence of women in the hôme. The old-time education, like the old-time religion, some men assert to be good enough for them. But the old-time education won't do for the boys and girls of today. The school should not reflect civilization, but should point the way for a better civilization.

Dr. Locke said he was not in favor of a compromised mechanical mixture to replace the imperfection in present-day educational systems. Ideas are the great essential in life. The boy or girl who is brought up in the city is handleapped in life. The boy in the city home has nothing to do, Moral training as such is a mighty poor thing. Today, as never before, is there a great need for men who can stand the test of fintegrity against the strength of the great corporations.
