

PLATFORM UPSET BY ANGRY CROWD IN LONDON PARK

Speakers at Men's Suffrage Meeting Rudely and Unexpectedly Silenced.

Much Incendiarism Reported From Various Parts of England.

[Canadian Press.] London, May 11.—Riotous scenes attended attempts of the Men's League for Women's Suffrage to hold a meeting in Hyde Park this afternoon. The police gave the league permission to use a platform and the overturning of the lorry by the crowd ended the proceedings. The meeting, as usual, started in an orderly manner, but when Mr. Laurier, the Hon. Mr. Balfour, and Mr. Leitch attempted to address the audience some 10,000 greeted him with hisses and cat-calls. The speech was interrupted by heated comments from his hearers. Other speakers met with even less success, interruptions taking the form of clouds of earth and other missiles.

One youth had an ingenious idea of annoying the speakers. By means of a piece of mirror he reflected the sun's rays on the faces of the speakers, causing such discomfort that they were obliged to turn round and address another section of the crowd.

Later one speaker made an allusion to the "ignorant hooligans." The crowd took this as a direct application to themselves, angry cries were raised and an ugly riot made for the lorry. The police made valiant efforts to keep back the excited crowd, but were practically powerless. The speakers made their departure hurriedly, but one was left when the lorry was captured. He took a flying leap last in time, for half a second later the wagon was completely overturned after a desperate heave by the protesting audience.

The speakers made their departures under police escort. There were many noisy rushes on the part of the crowd, but although the police and suffragists came in for some rough treatment they eventually reached safety.

Hyde Park Scenes. There were the usual suffragette scenes in the park. The police had another exciting afternoon's work, especially in the neighborhood of the Serpentine. Two attempts were made by women to plant flags in the park, but in one case the flag was seized by the police, while in the other instance they captured it. Its bearer was hustled and jostled until the police gave assistance.

Fire at Beckenham. A fire in a large, unoccupied house at Beckenham, outside of London, this evening was extinguished after three hours. The fire was attributed to the suffragettes. The firemen were alarmed at finding a bulky parcel in one of the burning rooms. They thought that it contained a bomb, but an examination revealed that it was merely a cylinder of gas.

Dublin Plot Unearthed. Dublin, May 11.—A tin canister containing 42 gunpowder cartridges was found last night in a room of the Empire Palace Theatre. The cartridges were padded all round with cotton wadding. A cotton cord, also oil-soaked, was attached to the canister, and the cord was burning when the bomb was found. A girl, formerly employed at the theatre, was arrested on suspicion, and known, however, that would connect her with the suffragette movement.

John Dillon Defiant. Dublin, May 11.—John Dillon, member of Parliament for East Mayo, surrounded by a band of suffragettes opposite the Mansion House on Saturday, told them that he would vote against them every time. Early Sunday morning Mr. Dillon's residence was bombarded with stones. Many windows were smashed. Three women were arrested on the charge of breaking the panes of the windows of the premises of the United Irish League about the same time.

Part of Crater Fell Into Mount Vesuvius [Canadian Press.] Naples, May 11.—The activity of Mount Vesuvius, which has been apparent for several days, reached a climax today, when a part of one crater collapsed with a deep roar. The tremblings of the mountain could be distinctly felt, and after the explosion observations showed that a funnel 250 feet deep had been formed. From this dense sulphurous clouds and white smoke ascended. Many tourists climbed the volcano.

LABOR INTERESTS NOT CONSIDERED BY GOVERNMENT

Liberal Amendment Was Shut Out Deliberately by Premier's Action.

Declare Vote Carried and Borden Navy Bill Motion Reported.

Ottawa, May 11.—When Liberalism found a hole in the craftily-constructed closure rule, and the Government found itself at 2:30 on Saturday morning faced with the possibility of considering an amendment by Mr. Carroll, of Cape Breton, before the bill could be finally put through, resort was had more to wiles than force. The methods, even without any formal sanction of rule, the amendment was in the shape of a new clause to be added to the bill. It provided that "whenever practicable in the construction of the ships provided under this act, the contractors or builders shall be bound to accept steel and other materials produced in Canada at the current prices for the time being in Canada."

Was Shut Out. This amendment, having in view the interests of Canadian labor and the development of Canadian resources as advocated by the framers of the National Policy, was shut out from all consideration by the action of Premier Borden and of Deputy Speaker Mondin in twice taking the floor away from Mr. Carroll after he had caught the speaker's eye.

The Prime Minister and his Nationalist deputy speaker refused to recognize Mr. Carroll's rights. The bill rules and put the motion that the bill be read a second time. The Ministerialists rose on the ensuing sham vote to record their indignation of the Premier's motion. The Liberals, opposing the motion, remained in their seats and cried "Shame."

A Small Vote. The vote which "carried" Premier Borden's motion to report the bill forthwith was: Coalition Ministerialists 53, Liberals, considerably less than half of the 221 members of the House voted at all. The seven still recalcitrant Nationalists remained discreetly away.

Germans Angered By Prof. Munsterburg [Canadian Press.] Berlin, May 11.—A good deal of attention has been attracted here by Prof. Munsterburg's New York speech last evening. Considering the objection of the Anglo-American peace centenary as part and parcel of the "perfidious Albion" scheme for the eventual demolition of Germany.

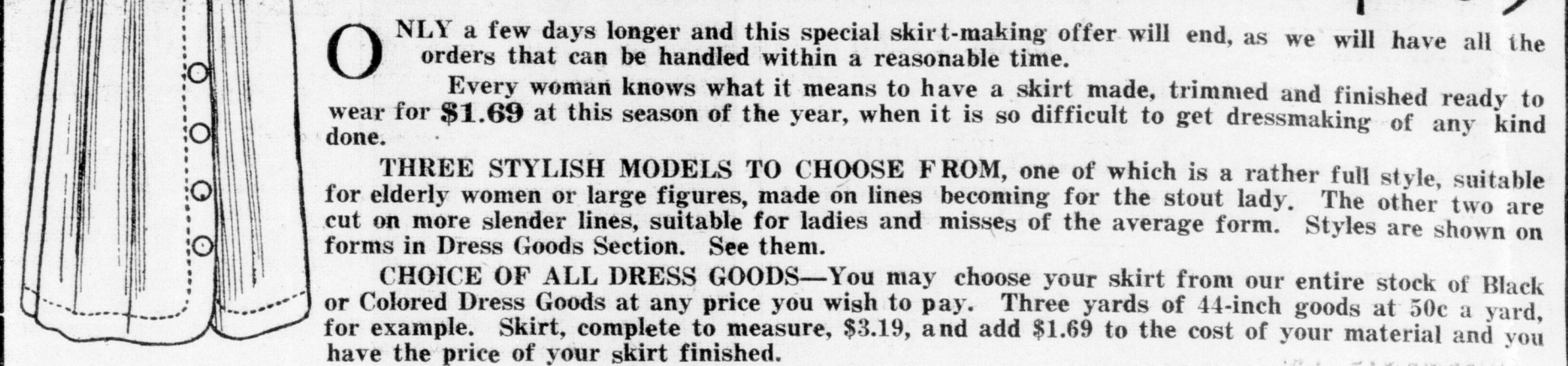
