

## 1,850 NAMES SECURED ON PETITIONS ALREADY

"Drys" Are Winning Over  
Many Citizens to Their Side  
in Liquor Fight.

Another big gun was loaded in the fight for liquor license reduction last night, when members of the W. C. T. U., the Men's Federation and the Ministerial Alliance met to hear a report of progress in obtaining signatures of those who are willing to get behind the reduction movement. Prof. James Bowman presided.

Harold W. Lyons, secretary of the social service commission, reported to the meeting that 1,850 names had now been secured, while 500 more were assured, making the total 2,350. It was stated that citizens generally are falling in line and that many more names will be secured before the time specified for the petition to go before the council arrives.

A committee has been elected to plan and later to conduct a campaign that will aid in carrying the work forward. The several societies named were well represented at the meeting. It is understood that a plan of campaign will be mapped out at once. Although working quietly, no time is being lost, it is said.

## MANY MEMBERS AT FRONT

B. S. U. Has Large Number of Volunteers—Attractive Dance Given.

An attendance of about 50 couples marked the first dance given this season by the British Social Union, in Hyman Hall, last night. The hall was decorated with large, colorful, and small flags. Music was supplied by the society's own orchestra. The committee in charge of the amusements has scheduled a number of dances and social evenings to be held in the Hyman Hall, throughout the season. Last season's affairs were all highly successful, the society is progressing rapidly, and the membership has been greatly increased with the approach of the winter season.

A large percentage of the male members of the society formed a part of the first contingent of troops who went from London to the front, and many more will leave with the second contingent. Despite this depletion in the ranks of the society, it is expected that with the numbers who have recently joined the British Social Union, their numbers will be as large as last year.

**BANISH STREET CANS.**  
**SAYS DR. F. L. BURDON**  
Chairman of Board of Health Says They Are Unsightly and In Sanitary.

That the street cans on the principal corners of London's streets are unsightly and insanitary and have long overlooked their usefulness was the declaration today of Dr. F. L. Burdon, chairman of the board of health.

The board of health will do all in its power to have these unsightly cans removed," said Dr. Burdon. "They are unsightly as advertising mediums and are originally designed for corner refuse receptacles. But since the city collects all the garbage there is absolutely no need for such cans on our streets. What we will do before taking any drastic steps is to bring the matter before the board of control and I have no doubt the board will order their removal on our recommendations. We have received a number of complaints of these cans and I believe their removal would be a sort of response to a public demand. The board has power to abate anything which becomes a nuisance."

**PUPILS SEWING BUSILY  
FOR BELGIAN REFUGEES**  
Citizens Can Help by Sending Discarded Clothing to the Class Teachers.

London people who want to help the Belgian refugees in some substantial manner can send men's, women's and children's old or discarded clothing or materials for new clothes to Miss Allen Neville or Miss Mary MacPherson, household science teachers, the former at the Normal school and the latter at the Collegiate Institute.

Both teachers have started sewing classes to help the Belgian refugees. At the Collegiate about \$15 was raised to purchase materials, and eleven sewing machines employed for the work. The classes are wholly voluntary and sew Friday afternoons.

Miss Neville's classes meet Thursday and Friday and today 42 girls, with an enthusiasm surprising to Miss Neville, took up the Belgian relief work. They will sew all varieties of clothing for the Belgian children, and in addition could use donations of old clothing, such as men's suits and women's dresses which they could cut down or make over to fit some Belgian boy or girl whose all is now tied up in a little bandanna handkerchief.

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**ENGINEER VOLUNTEERS**  
W. N. Ashplant Has Filed Application As Seventh Lieutenant.

City Engineer W. N. Ashplant, who has had several clashes with the members of the board of control and certain of the aldermen who have tried to usurp the powers of the engineer, has filed his application as a lieutenant in the Seventh Regiment, for instruction in the provisional school for officers which is now being opened here if enough officers apply.

As an officer in the Seventh Regiment, he is also a volunteer for service with the second contingent.

**REQUIRES CONSIDERATION**  
I. B. Whale Refuses to Discuss Belgian Immigration Scheme.

An idea has been submitted to Premier Healey by the representative of a large farming concern near Brampton to induce farming interests in different parts of the country to donate 50-acre farms, on which the Government could locate Belgian refugees. I. B. Whale, the representative for the London district of the department of agriculture, was asked yesterday for his opinion of the scheme, but he refused to express himself until he has had time to consider the matter.

"Many things would have to be taken into consideration," Mr. Whale pointed out. "Possibly our soil would not be suitable for the particular class of farming to which the Belgians have been accustomed. They are good workers, all right, and many of them make good in Canada on sugar-beet farms, but expressing an opinion, however, I would have to know more about their adaptability. The labor conditions just now also make it difficult to pass judgment on such a proposal of land."

The proposal made to Mr. Healey was accompanied by the offer of two farms of 50 acres each, and the suggestion was made that farmers might be induced to give twenty such farms, which would provide for 200 Belgian families.
