OVER 100 FIND WORK IN CITY DURING WEEK

Over 100 men received work last week through the efforts of the government employment bureau, according to figures issued today. The majority of these men secured jobs with the city of London.

Fifteen men were placed on farms by Superintendent J. C. Spence at wages from \$25 to \$35 per month with board and washing. Two machinists, one tool worker and one silk worker, were placed in jobs in other cities.

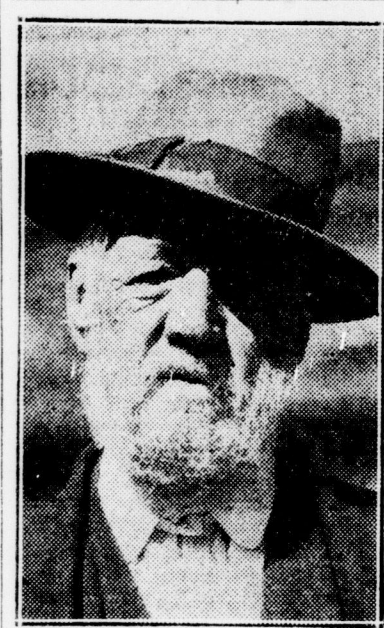

WHITE ROSE SAYS TODAY IS BIRTHDAY OF J. B. COX



Noted Grain Buyer Active as Ever in Spite of His 83 Years.

POPULAR FIGURE

Today J. B. Cox, veteran grain buyer, is celebrating his 83rd birthday. Incidentally Mr. Cox is wearing a white rose on this occasion and is also purchasing hay and grain on the local market as he has done for the last 60 years.

Just twice a year do "J. B.'s" poetic instincts demand floral expression of this kind, his birthday, and St. George's Day when he wears a red rose.

With nothing to show that he has passed the three score years and ten stage in the highway of life except the entry in the family Bible, Mr. Cox is abroad on the local square today with his cane and his ever-present cigar.

Mr. Cox was born in 1842 at Thorny Plots, Nottinghamshire, England, and he still has well-defined recollections of his boyhood home. In 1861, at the age of nine years, "J. B." together with his parents, took passage on an American vessel of 200 cabin and 600 steerage capacity bound for New York.

For 54 long days the little craft was tossed about on the stormy Atlantic, but at last arrived at New York.

The couple from the port to Buffalo and Port Stanley was accomplished by train.

Port Stanley was much larger than the little town of London, for in the hill and watch the many sailing vessels plowing across the lake, laden with grain, was a pretty sight.

Mr. Cox as he dropped his newspaper and lit his cigar for the third time. After arriving in London, which was then a mere settlement, all the business being transacted in the west end of the city, the Cox family bought a farm in South Dorchester, 18 miles from London.

It was here that he developed the hardy constitution which has been his best friend throughout the years. Mr. Cox spent six years on that little farm.

The year 1857 found him working in the grain business of Roe brothers in St. Thomas. Two years later he came to London to manage a warehouse for the same firm. He remained in Roe brothers' employment for six years.

This was not by any means Mr. Cox's first visit to London, for in 1851, accompanied by his parents, he came from Mapleton to buy furniture at an establishment opposite the present site of the courthouse.

Upon the failure of Roe brothers in 1865, Mr. Cox acquired a desire to again visit New York city. So in company with an intimate friend, John Beard, he left London behind him on the 17th of March.

But four months of living in the metropolis convinced "J. B." that he really did like London. So he returned here, and Mr. Cox adds with undiminished pride that this was the only time he was out of the city for any length of time in 64 years.

Lauds Chestnuts. Attributing his good health to his always carrying a handful of chestnuts in his pocket, Mr. Cox has never experienced rheumatism. This preventative measure was told him by his father, who also was unbothered by the joint.

Mr. Cox is fond of walking and his Sunday rambles to Springbank and the surrounding country would quickly tire one much younger than himself.

Mr. Cox is a life member of the St. George's society, and its present measure due to his secretaryship of more than 25 years. Mr. Cox organized the society in 1867. He is also a life member of the Kilwinning lodge, No. 64, A. F. & A. M.

For a short period, quite a number of years ago, "J. B." had the distinction of acting as proxy as the first American candidate in the city. He issued the declarations and manifests necessary to conduct international trade.

From early morn until late at night "J. B." is watching the loads as they enter the square and appraising the residents of the city and 64 years of active service has made him beloved by the farmers for miles around.

As far as "J. B.'s" health is concerned, he never could walk from Mapleton to London on a cold winter's morning as he did many years ago.

JEDDAH REPORT UNTRUE.

London, Feb. 16.—It is learned that Dr. Naji El Assil, representative in London of the kingdom of the Hedjaz, has received a telegram from King Ali, dated at Jeddah last Saturday, dealing with matters of routine and making no mention of the political or military situation.

Dr. Assil therefore concludes that the earlier report that Jeddah had fallen to the forces of Ibn Saud was untrue.

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THOUSANDS SIGN
4.4 BEER PROTEST

Petition Circulated in 50 City Churches Sunday—Delegation Leaves.

Thousands of Londoners have signed a petition by way of protest against the weakening of the Ontario temperance act through permission of the sale of 4.4 per cent beer.

The petition, which was circulated in 50 city churches yesterday by the local branch of the Ontario Prohibition Union, will be placed before the provincial temperance convention being held in Toronto tomorrow, and later presented to Premier G. H. Ferguson, Davis Ross, president of the local union, who went to Toronto today, will present the petition to the convention tomorrow.

The petition reads as follows: "We, the church, electors of the city of London, protest against the increase of the alcoholic strength of liquor as indicated by the speech from the throne, believing it to be a serious weakening of the Ontario temperance act, and a decided step backward in temperance legislation."

Mr. Ross will head a delegation from London that will number between 25 and 50 persons. Included in the list, representing the W. C. T. FIRST SPEEDERS OF YEAR
DRAW \$10 FINES TODAY

In police court this morning three speeders paid the minimum fine of \$10 and costs, after pleading guilty before Magistrate Graydon. They are the first speeders to be brought to court this year.

MANY HOGS SHIPPED.
