KING NEED NOT RESIGN; HAS RIGHT TO CONTINUE AND TEST WILL OF HOUSE

Constitutional Authority Says Premier Is Justified-His Resignation Cannot Be Forced.

HAS MARGIN OF ONE Meighen Likely To Have 122

Seats, With 123 Against Him -Outlook Is Precarious.

Ottawa, Oct. 30 .- Premier King need not tender his resignation to the governor-general, nor can the governor-general call upon him to do so. Mr. King is quite justified in finding a new seat and in carrying on his government until parliament meets, and the will of the new house of commons is tested,

This is the statement of an author. ity on constitutional procedure whose opinion is regarded as important. On the basis of such opinon the probability is that Mr. King will continue as prime minister, and that he will appoint new ministers to replace the eight members of his sonal defeat yesterday. Some of the defeated ministers may obtain new seats, but undoubtedly new faces would appear if appointments are made.

ELGIN COUNTY PIONEER DIES IN PORT STANLEY


Matthew Payne Came to Port to Construct First Breakwater.
