FURTHER CONSIDERATION IN

THE HOUSE OF LORDS.

Salisbury Anxious to Bring about a Collision—Same Fears of the Radicals—Dister Tenant Right—The, Lords Amendments Readined—Reasons by Lords and Commons Committees.

London, August 12.—During the discussion of the land bill in the house of commons last night, Healey spoke of the dirty work of the lords, and described them as hereditary enemies of the Irish people. The speaker called Healey to order. Parnell declared that the government was attempting to carry out the views of the lords in an underhand manner.

Lord Salisbury is reported to be anxious to bring about a collision with the government on the land bill amendments. He is of opinion that unless the upper house makes a determined stand on the question the Radicals will not stop until they have annihilated squirearchy. But cooler heads in the lords, even out and-out Tories like Lord Oranmore, see that the collision would be disastrous. The Whig element in the lords is, on the whole, true to the government, and the rejection of the bill would not only arouse a storm in Ireland, but would give the Radicals what they would eagerly seize—an opportunity for appealing to the country against the house of lords itself.
