The St. Louis Hotel has changed hands, the transfer being made today. The purchaser is Mr. A. M. Thompson, formerly proprietor of the Carlyle Hotel, Woodstock. The purchase price is said to be \$52,000.00. The deal was put through by A. D. Holyoke of Montreal.

"Caribou" Boudreau, the retiring proprietor has become, in the years he conducted the St. Louis one of the best known hotel men in New Brunswick. Always a hustler he has built up a large trade and has made many friends who will regret to learn that he has quit the hotel.

The new proprietor, Mr. A. M. Thompson is well known up and down the St. John river, and no doubt will be as popular here as he was in Woodstock.

## BUSY TIME FOR FIRE DEPT.

Four Alarms Rung in During Past Week—Little Damage.

The past week has been a busy one for the Fire Department, which has responded to four alarms in as many days. The prompt response and the use of the chemical engine has in two cases proven the worth of that piece of fire fighting appliance.

The first alarm was rung in Saturday afternoon for a slight fire on the roof of a house on Hillside Street owned by Mr. E. F. Kerr and occupied by A. Gallant. It was promptly extinguished and little damage was done.

A little later the same afternoon another alarm was rung in for a slight blaze in Mrs. J. K. Thompson's kitchen, where hot coals had fallen upon the floor. This was extinguished by the chemical with little damage.

Sunday evening an alarm was rung in for a chimney fire in the Gillis block opposite the C. N. R. depot. No damage resulted.

About three o'clock on Monday afternoon the department was again called out for a fire in the house of Mr. Joseph Capogreco on Sugar Loaf Street. This fire was a particularly hard one to get at, the fire having originated from the electric wiring between the floors. A portion of the floor was removed and the chemicals used, which soon extinguished the blaze. The prompt arrival of the department and equipment it had to work with was the means of preventing a considerable loss being sustained here.

## IMPROVED TRAIN SERVICE DEMANDED

Officials of C. N. R. Informed of Discrimination Against Campbellton.

A largely attended meeting of citizens was held in the Curling Rink Monday afternoon to discuss the matter of the suburban train service from Bathurst and Campbellton.

As set forth in the columns last week it is impossible for residents east of Campbellton to come to town to transact business without spoiling two days and two nights. This is a serious matter especially at this season of the year, when farmers need every hour.

The whole matter was discussed and it was decided to write C. A. Hayes, Vice-President of the C. N. R. at Toronto setting forth the need of a suburban service.

A wire was sent Mr. Hayes and an answer has been received promising to look into the matter. An answer was sent stating that a definite answer would be rendered within one week. If the service is not restored the matter will be taken to higher authorities as we must have this suburban service.
