ON THE NEW YORK EXCHANGE—A DROP IN PRICE.

The Northern Pacific lands—trying to close the railway war.

New York, Nov. 22.—The excitement on the stock market today was greater than any time since the spring. Every establishment where there was a "ticker" was crowded. It looked as one time as if there would be a panic, but the decline was recovered and an advance over yesterday's prices was established. It is understood that the railway magnates will hold a meeting to-morrow to endeavor to adjust their differences.

PITTSBURGH, Nov. 22.—The oil market is excited today. Prices dropped seven cents from the highest point and the market closed at 2 1/2.

New York, Nov. 22.—The Northern Pacific railway has decided to sell 8,000,000 acres of its lands east of the Missouri at \$4 an acre, payable in Northern Pacific preferred stock.

Grain Gambling in Indianapolis.

INDIANAPOLIS, Nov. 22.—The National Grange yesterday adopted resolutions demanding that grain gambling be repressed by law, and repudiating all leadership in politics except that which tends to the advancement of the material interests of the people through the exercise of virtuous and dignified and upright citizenship. The strong political spirit of the resolutions caused much discussion and created much commotion.

Bank Managers Fooled.

DEATH OF THURLOW WEED.

The Veteran Editor Surrounded by His Family—A Sketch of His Career.

New York, Nov. 22.—Thurlow Weed died here this morning at 8.55. He was surrounded at his death by his children and grandchildren, physicians, nurses and attendants of the household. Although death was expected, yet the bereavement is severely felt by his family. His daughter Harriet, who devoted her life to her father, was so overcome by it that she had to be supported by attendants. The grief to the other children is none the less profound. Just before passing away, Weed, grasping his right hand around her neck, as though he sought his children's hands. His grand-daughter took the extended hand and felt a soft pressure; and the next moment he was dead.

Thurlow Weed was born in Cairo, N. Y., in 1797. He worked as a cabin boy on a Hudson river canal boat when only ten years of age, and at twelve he was working for a printer in Catskill. When the war of 1812 began young Weed volunteered into the American army. At his majority he owned a newspaper. In 1826 and 1827 he was engaged in editing the Anti-Masonic Enquirer. Twice elected to the assembly of the Empire, he never afterwards accepted a political position, however important, honorable or remunerative. Mr. Weed was a clever party manager, and is given a large share of the credit due to the men who secured the election of De Witt Clinton as governor of New York. He assumed editorial charge of the Albany Evening Journal in the year 1830. His endeavours on behalf of William Henry Harrison, Zachary Taylor, Winfield Scott, Fremont and Lincoln, nominated for the presidency, are well known. He was not noted for sustained effort, for great excellence of style, or for unusual information. His force lay in brief paragraphs, in which the same idea was iterated and reiterated, in every possible form. He had come to be looked upon as a Nestor by journalists and politicians, and the expressions of regret at his death will be general and sincere.

London, Nov. 22.—The Daily News in an editorial on the late Thurlow Weed says: "He was a type of an American politician and statesman, but a wire puller, a schemer, a lobbyist and a first instance. His death leaves no particular gap, but will be remembered in politics longer than greater men."

THE HALIFAX HORROR.

The Coroner's Jury—The Verdict—The Poor House Authorities Condemned.

HALIFAX, N. S., Nov. 22.—The coroner's jury investigating the recent destruction by fire of the poorhouse brought in a lengthy verdict, in which they express their opinion that the fire was accidental; but that the authorities are most reprehensible for having provided some means of escape for the unfortunate old men and women in the hospital wards at the top of the building. They recommended the appointment of a commission by the provincial government to enquire into the general management and efficiency of the different provincial public charities.

FATAL MINING ACCIDENT.

Two Men Killed and Several Injured.

SCANTON, Pa., Nov. 22.—At the new Ayr shaft, Oxford colliery, this evening a large platform, upon which an immense quantity of ice had accumulated, crashed 100 feet to the bottom of the shaft where the stokers were working. There was no possibility of escape and two men were killed and several severely injured.

BERIERS FILES.

London, Nov. 22.—The Pioneer Iron Foundry, Lumber Mills at Burlington, Vt., destroyed—Loss of the New Manufactured Cotton Mills.

BURLINGTON, Vt., Nov. 22.—Several lumber mills and the Pioneer Iron Foundry were burned this morning. Loss, \$50,000.

EMBRU, Nov. 22.—The Spring Grove mills, about a mile from this place, owned by Mr. H. W. Sutherland, were burned this morning.

New Hartford, Nov. 22.—The New Hartford Cotton Co's mill caught fire through the explosion of a lamp this evening. The insurance amounted to \$50,000, which the company claims will not cover their loss.

LONDON, Nov. 22.—A fire occurred at the Imperial Oil Company's works early this morning, which destroyed property to the value of nearly \$5000. The night watchman, John Moran, was so badly burned that his life is despaired of.

THE ITALIAN PARLIAMENT

PATRIOTIC SPEECH DELIVERED BY THE KING.

The People Ripe for Liberty—Italy's Peaceful Relations—Army and Navy Reforms.

ROME, Nov. 22.—In his speech to-day the king said he greeted with pride the representatives of the nation, fortified by the free vote of all classes of its citizens. This admirable transformation, prepared by the king's own hand, gave an assurance that the people were ripe for liberty. The king imposed upon the parliament the duty of carrying out those real conquests which give a title to real greatness. He indicated the subjects for legislation: the condition of manufacturers, agriculture and mercantile, the navy and the public security, the administration of justice and the elaboration of a penal code for the whole country. The relations of Italy with the foreign world were friendly. Italy responded to the marks of sympathy from all, by scrupulously observing the treaty, by advocating in the councils of the powers a policy of peace and reconciliation, by the national interests with those of Europe.
