Development of gold finds in the Rainy River district, he says, is retarded by the absence of railway facilities.

The case of St. Louis vs. the Queen The case of St. Louis vs. the Queen was argued before the Supreme Court to day on appeal from the judgment of the Exchequer Court in a suit by St. Louis for an alleged balance due for building the bridge over the Lachine Canal. 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WHO BETRAYED THE CITY?

THE MAYOR SAYS THERE WAS A LEAK IN THE CITY HALL

Hr. Blake's Opinion on the Bond Suff Given to the Press by Some Official and Published Despite Instructions to Keep it Secret-A Rigid Investigation

City Treasurer Coady arrived in the city from England on the 12.15 train yesterday, carrying with him a bundle of walking sticks for his friends, Mr. Coady has ben engaged since his departure in legal difficulties with Messrs. Paulin, Sorley & Martin, over the city bond dispute. He stated that the suit which the Scotch firm had brought against the city had been postponed and would be heard in Edinburgh.

The most important utterance he made, however, was that an alleged despatch from London, Eng., published in The Mail and Empire of Aus. 21, giving the opinion of the Hon. Edward Blake on the case, had angered Mayor Kennedy much and injured the city's case in London.

A letter from Messrs. Freshfield & Williams, the London solicitors of the city of Toronto, was received in Mr. Fullerton's office on Aug. 20. It enclosed Mr. Blake's opinion. On Wednesday, Aug. 21, a despatch, headed "Toronto Bonds," appeared on the front page of The Mail and Empire, which included the opinion of Mr. Alexander Asher, Q.C., which had also been sent to the city solicitor's office and the following paragraph as to Mr. Blake:

"Mr. Edward Blake, Q.C., M.P., has also been consulted. In his opinion the fact that the city did not avail itself of permissive legislation to pass a bylaw to issue 4 per cents, does not constitute a ground of action, and in the absence of any by-law the city is not responsible. In his opinion, however, the moral aspect of the question, apart from the strictly legal and technical, does not place the city of Toronto in a favorable light, and that it has an most important utterance he

from the strictly legal and technical, does not place the city of Toronto in a favorable light, and that it has an unfortunate appearance that the authorities should have availed themselves of the want of the corporate seal to a resolution which would otherwise have been legally binding."

This opinion is known to have been cabled back to England by some agent of Paulin, Sorley & Martin in Toronto, and its publication, it is said, did the city's case much injury.
