BROOKE COUNCIL.

Inwood, 24th June, 1911.
Council met pursuant to adjournment. Members all present. Minutes of previous meeting read, and on motion of Mr. Tait, seconded by Mr. Munro, were approved.

James Cooke submitted statement showing number of loads of gravel drawn on to 6-7 side-road, con. 11, under his superintendence, and he was granted an order for \$453.57 for work performed.

John Campbell applied for remuneration for 16 sheep and lambs killed and 4 injured by dogs, loss valued by Inspector at \$75.00.

Sutton-Monro, that order be issued on Treasurer in favor of Mr. Campbell for the sum of \$103.33 being two-thirds of estimate.—Carried.

Wellington Lucas submitted about the slow progress being made in the cleaning out of the 10-11 con. road drain.

By-law introduced and read, changing the Polling Place for Subdivision No. 4, from Code's Hall in the village of Alvinston, to the School House in Section No. 6, Lot 20, Con. 7.

Monro-Fisher, that by-law be read and finally passed.—Carried.

By-law introduced and read to authorize a loan of \$1500 by issue of debentures, to Union School Section No. 7 Brooke and No. 11 Euphemina.

Monro-Tait, that by-law be read a third time and finally passed.—Carried.

Debentures were received and opened for these debentures, and sold at a premium of one and one-half per cent.

Notice received from the Solicitors of the Canada Southern Ry. Co. of intention to appeal to County Judge against their assessment.

Darvill-Sutton, that a grant of \$10.00 be made in aid of the Inwood Band.—Carried.

Sutton-Monro, that Council open a Court of Revision on the assessment in the Lucas Bros. Drain By-law, the Reeve in the chair.—Carried.

Fisher-Monro, that as there are no appeals, the Engineer's assessment be adopted and Court closed.—Carried.

Fisher-Monro, that the Court of Revision on the Edgar Drain By-law No. 2, be again adjourned till next meeting of Council.—Carried.

Sutton-Monro, that the adjourned Court of Revision on the Assessment Roll for 1911, be reopened the Reeve in the chair.—Carried.

The following changes were asked for and granted, viz:

Wesley Bessenden to be assessed for N h f w pt lot 1, con. 1, in place of C. York.

Wm. D. Temple as tenant lot N h f 30, con. 6.

Walter M. Ross as owner S w 12, con. 7, in place of Wilbert Ross, and Wilbert Ross to be assessed jointly with E. Ross for N h f 12, con. 7.

James McElrath, gentleman, M.F. lot E h f 17, con. 9, and Malcolm McNichol, gentleman, as M.F. lot w h f 19, con. 12.

Monro-Tait, that the foregoing changes and additions be made in Roll, and adopted, and

Court closed.—Carried.

Requests were made by Wesley Temple and P. G. Handsford, to have the Brooke and Enniskillen Townline Drain cleaned out, across concessions one and two.

Fisher-Tait, that Engineers Code and Jones be instructed to examine the locality, and if they jointly deem it necessary that the Townline drain be cleaned out, or a new outlet be made farther east to the Carpenter drain, under section 75 of The Municipal Drainage Act; to report in favor of one or both, with the required estimates, assessments, plans, etc.—Carried.

John McCallum, Reeve of Alvinston, and J. C. Boudier, President Board of Trade, appeared as a deputation from these bodies, suggesting and urging the propriety of jointly building a Town Hall in the village of Alvinston, to be used by both municipalities for their meetings, with offices and vaults for each.

Sutton-Tait, that a committee composed of the Reeve and Deputy Reeve and Councillor Fisher be appointed to make enquiries relative to the matter, and report at next meeting of Council.—Carried.

Monro-Tait, that a committee be appointed, composed of the Reeve and Councillors Sutton and Fisher, to prepare plans, specifications and agreements necessary for the erection of a new concrete and steel bridge over Brown's Creek on 15-16 sidero d, con. 12. Committee to be empowered to ask for and accept tenders and oversee the work.—Carried.

Darvill-Fisher, that the Engineer be instructed to examine 15-16 sideroad drain across concessions 3, 4, 5 and 6, and if found needing repairs, to report in a way to enable Council to proceed with the work.—Carried.

Darvill-Monro, that the agreement made by the Inwood Rural Telephone Co. and the Advisory Board, the Brooke Municipal Telephone System, dated 2nd of May, 1911, be ratified by the Council of the Township of Brooke, for a term of three years; on condition that an absolutely free interchange of service be given between the subscribers of the two systems.—Carried.

Archibald Monro, Commissioner over the following drains, reported them completed, the receipts and expenditures on each being given in detail.

Monro-Sutton, that Council do now adjourn to meet in the Village of Alvinston on Saturday the 15th day of July 1911.—Carried.

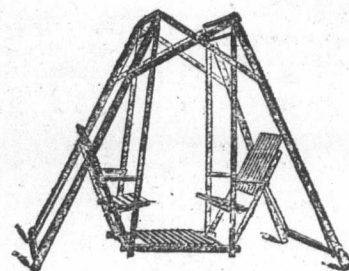
