 beets as formerly owing to prices
 and the situation in regard to secur-
 ing help.

Wanstead Beet Growers' Associ-
 ation held a meeting to protest
 against the price paid for sugar
 beets by the Dominion Sugar Com-
 pany and to raise necessary funds
 to have legal investigation of what
 they claim to be their rights. The
 sugar company has paid farmers at
 the rate of \$10.95 as the average
 price for sugar for months of Octo-
 ber, November December and Janu-
 ary, and the growers claim these
 prices were not justified on account
 of the high price at which sugar
 was until recently selling.

Safety First:

A very fine set of dies has just
 been received. They will stamp out
 the wire cloth, form the tin rims and
 finish up complete the bowls for 5½
 inch kitchen strainers. These dies
 were made at the Rockford plant
 and it is our intention to make four
 or five sets, but in other sizes, in our
 own machine shop.

In order to insure as nearly one
 hundred per cent. accuracy as pos-
 sible in keeping record of hours, thus
 avoiding the unpleasantness of
 shortages and overages in the pay
 envelopes we are installing an atten-
 dance board. One half of this Board
 is called the "Out" section and the
 other the "In" section. When Dick or
 Maude come in they take their tick-
 et from the "Out" pocket and place
 it in the "In" pocket and as these
 tickets are stamped with exact time
 of arrival and going out the exact
 hours are thus recorded.
