

Inspectors condemn animals unfit for human food, but a correspondent says that when these animals are killed, cut up, and carted to the tank room in order to be steamed and to become "fertilizer stock" the tongue and fat, are apt to be overlooked. The tongue is thrown in with others uncked, canned, and sent into the export trade. The fat is used for refined "oleomargarine." In the "tank room" the diseased meat is put into a clean tank preparatory to the steaming, by which destruction is supposed to be completed. But, directly the inspector has turned his back the lid is taken off, and the ondemned meat is taken directly to the "chell-rooms," and mixed with other stock
