This caisson was out on a sand-bar, and the tide was so low there was absolutely no current at this point at the time; and as there was only 4 ft. of water in the working chamber, there was a very light air pressure. Due, I think, to some carelessness, the two doors of the air lock were allowed to be opened at the same time, and in this way there was a rush of water into the body of the cais-
