STOCKS AND PRICES

No. 1 white pine lath is bringing \$3.25 in Chicago, and mixed \$2.75.

Receipts of lumber at the Tonuwanda for June of this year were 75,086,118 feet, which exceeds the corresponding month of last year by 30,000,000 feet.

In the Saginaw valley 18 inch XXXX pine shingles are held at \$3.50 and \$3.66; clear butts at \$2.50 and \$2.60; 16-inch pine, \$3 for XXXX, and clear butts at \$1.75.

At Buffalo first-class elm staves and 6foot coiled hoops are selling at \$7.50 to \$7.75, and basswood heading at 5¼ and 6 cents. A limited quantity is being received from Canada.

At a meeting in Vancouver on June 27th, of the United States and British Columbia firms, comprising the Pacific Coast Lumber Association, an agreement is said to have been reached that there should be a uniform price for lumber and shingles in the eastern states markets.

FOREIGN MARKETS.

Messrs. S. P. Musson & Co., of Barbadoes, in their trade circular of June 22nd, say regarding lumber : The only arrivals to note in this line are, the "Herbert Rice" from Meteghan, with 148,000 ft. spruce, which was placed at \$16.87 shipping, \$12.87 2nd quality. Next receipts will, we fear, have to accept lower prices, seasonbeing over. In White Pine, the "Harry Troop" has arrived from Jordan River with 21S,000 ft. This is one of the cargoes referred to in our last as sold to arrive at \$24 and \$19 for first and second quality respectively. Pitch Pine-Nothingnew to report. Shingles-We can only confirm our last advices, and mention that two or three cargoes are reported on the

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Shooks-The S. S. "Navigator" 'brought 600 bdls. for importers account. Hoops-Lotting rates unchanged-season over.

The announcement is made that if the Bristel Docks Bill, now before the British Parliament, is approved, a large enterprise looking to the development of trade between Bristol, Canada, Jamaica and the United States will be established.

Messrs. Foy, Morgan & Co. will sell by auction at Hull, Eng., on the 16th inst., a parcel of Canadian doors.

THE BOSTON MARKET.

There is a very good demand for spruce lumber, and the market is fully as firm as, previously noted. The only weak spot is on; matched spruce boards, which are somewhat weaker owing to an oversupply. Prices are firmly held at : Ten and 13 in. dimensions, \$18 to 19.50; 9-in. and under, \$17 to 18; 10 and 12 inch random lengths, 10 feet and up, \$17.50 to 18.50; 2x3, 2x4, 2x5, 2x6, 2x7 and 3x4, 10 feet and up, \$15 to 16; all other randoms, 9-in. and under, 10 feet and up, \$15.50 to 17; 5-in. and up, merchantable Loards, \$15 to 17; matched boards, \$16 to 17; out spruce boards, \$12.50 ; bundle furring, \$14.

Hemlock remains firm and unchanged : Pennsylvania, No. 1, \$16 to 17, No. 2, \$14, 1 to 15; eastern Pennsylvania Loards, \$15 to 16; random, \$13 to \$14.

The situation in western pine is unchanged, shippers being very firm. Here, the market is quiet, with prices firm: Uppers, 1 in., \$58 to 62; 134 to 2 in., \$63 to 64: 3 and 4 in., \$68 to 72; selects. 1 to 4 ig., \$52 to 64; fine common, 1 to 3 in.,. \$45 to 60; sheathings, \$38 to 54; barn boards, \$25 to 30; coffin boards, \$23 to 25--

The steamer Frederick King has been chartered to load deals at St. John, N.B., for w. c. of England, at 418 jd.

Bark Carrie L. Smith has been chartered to load lumber in the Bay of Fundy, including Bridgewater, for Buenos Ayres, at \$10, if Rosario, \$11.

Among recent imports at Bristol was a cargo of spruce from Québec, the bulk of which was for Fry, the well-known cocoa firm, with a small parcel of ends for Taylor & Low Bros.

Miramichi lumber shipments to June 15th totalled 41,428,156 feet, against 27,-.610,109 feet to the same date last year. F. E. Neale is the largest shipper, being credited to date with 19,543,900 s. f. Ho has chartered for about 15,000,000 more.

St. John, N.B., advices report thatschooner Mabel Hall is loading laths for Philadelphia at 65 conts; steamer Bernard is on her way to Liverpool with a cargo of deals, and the barque Ashlow is loading for Buenos Ayres; steamer Pawnee has been chartered to load deals for Liverpool, at 40s.

The National Lumber Exporter's Association of the United States has brought an action against the Atlantic Transport Steamship Line for having refused to give a clean bill of lading on a shipment of hardwood lumber consigned by Samuel A. Bennett to Messrs. Leary & Co., of Lonon. This action is brought to secure an interpretation by the Courts of the Act of Congress, known as the "Harter Act." which provides as follows :-- " Section 4: That it shall be the duty of the owner . . to issue to shippers . . a bill of lading or shipping document stating, among other things, the marks necessary for.identification, number of packages or quantity; stating whether it be carrier's or shipper's receipt : . and such document shall be prima facie, evidence of the receipt of the merchandise therein described." "Section 5: That for a violation of any of the provisions of this Act the . . owner who refuses to issue, on demand, the bill of lading herein provided for shall be liable to a fine not exceeding Two Thousand Dollars."

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
