INSTANCE OF GREAT ACE.

HEN I came first to live at Bolton, . I was told feveral particulars of the great age of Henry Jenkins, but I believed little of the flory, for many years, till one day he coming to be; an alms, I defired him to tell me truly how old he was. He paufed a little, and then faid, that to the best of his remembrance he was 162 or 3. And Lasked, what Kings he remembered? He faid, Henry the Eighth. I asked, what public thing he could longest remember? He faid, Flowdennield. I asked, whether the King was there? He faid, no, he was in France, and the Earl of Surry was General. I asked him, how old he might be then? He faid, I believe I might be between 10 and 12. for, fays he, I was fent to Northallerton, with a horse load of arrows; but they fent a bigger boy from thence to the army then. All this agreed with the hiltory of that time; for bows and arrows were then used; the Earl he named was General; and King Henry the Eighth was then at fournay: And yet it is observable that this Jenkins could neither write nor read. There were also four or five in the fame parish, that were reputed all of them to be 100 years old, or within 2 or 3 years of it, and they all faid, he was an elderly man ever fince they knew him, for he was born in another parish, and before any registers were in churches, as it s faid: He told me then too, that he was butler to the Lord Conyers, and remembered the Abbot of Fountain's abbey very well, before the diffolution of the monafteries. Henry Jenkins departed this life December, 1670, at Ellerton upon Swale, in Yorkshire. The battle of Flowdensield was fought September 9th, 1513, and he was about 12 years old when Flowdenfield was fought; so that this Henry Jenkins lived 169 years, 16 longer than old Parr, and was the oldest man born upon the ruins of this postdiluvian world. In the last century of his life he was a fisherman, and uled to trade in the streams; his diet was coarle and four; but towards the latter end of his days, he begged up, and down. He hath fworn in

Chancery and other courts to above 140 years memory, and was often at the affizes at York, where he generally went on food and I have heard fome of the country gentlemen affirm, that he frequently (wam in the rivers after he was past the age of ico years. In the King's Remembrancer's office in the Exchequer, is a record of a deposition, in a cause by English bill, be-1665, at Kettering in Yorkthire, where Henry Jenkins, of Ellerton upon Swale labourer, aged 157 years, was produced. and deposed as a witness.
