

Business of the House

Mr. Hamilton (Qu'Appelle): The policy position that I took in the committee is one that I should like to keep here, namely that when an hon. member asks me about a particular road, I will give him the information if it has been approved and agreed upon between the two parties. But if it has not been agreed upon and it is still a matter of discussion between the two governments, I think it would be better not to say anything about it.

Mr. Granger: I should like to thank the minister for his answer. That is fair enough. As it is practically six o'clock, Mr. Chairman, I wonder whether I may call it that before I continue with my oration.

Resolutions adopted in committee of supply this day reported and concurred in.

BUSINESS OF THE HOUSE

Mr. Pickersgill: I wonder whether the house leader would be good enough, for the convenience of hon. members, to indicate again the order of the business for Monday so that it will be in today's *Hansard* and whether, at the same time, he could give an assurance that none of the finance bills will be taken up until Tuesday.

Mr. Green: Yes, Mr. Speaker; I shall be glad to give that assurance. It is the intention to go on with the items standing in the name of the Minister of Finance on Tuesday.

Mr. Pickersgill: Regardless of the progress made on Monday?

Mr. Green: Yes; I think so. On Monday we shall start with items Nos. 18 and 21 on today's order paper, both of which stand in the name of the Prime Minister, the first having to do with a simultaneous translation system and the second with the federal district commission. Then we shall take item No. 1 on today's paper, which has to do with the setting up of a lakehead harbour commission; then item No. 7, which is a minor Senate amendment to the Lake of the Woods Control Board Act, 1921, and stands in the name of the Minister of Northern Affairs and National Resources; then item No. 9, second reading of an act to amend the Indian Act, standing in the name of the Minister of Citizenship and Immigration; then three items in the name of the Minister of Justice, namely Nos. 8, 12 and 17, one being an amendment to the Penitentiary Act, the second an amendment to the Criminal Code and the third a resolution concerning the national parole board; then item No. 20, which is a resolution concerning the Emergency Gold Mining Assistance Act, in the name of the Minister of Mines and Technical Surveys.

At six o'clock the house adjourned, without question put, pursuant to the order of the house passed on August 4.
