What qualifications are required by the vocational training instructors and industrial instructors who are employed by penitentiaries?

### Questions

Hon. G. J. McIlraith (Solicitor General): Vocational training and industrial and maintenance instructors in the Canadian Penitentiary Service must possess at least a Grade 10 education, hold a journeyman certificate and have experience in the trade or specialty in which they are employed as instructors. Additionally, for vocational training instructors, those holding a teaching certificate are given priority in selection and are paid an allowance for such qualification.

### Question No. 1,085—Mr. Orlikow:

- 1. What are the qualifications of the present senior staff officials at the Prison for Women at Kingston?

Thirteen and onehalf years experience mainly in the area of treatment and training from 1956 under the supervision of M. Gauthier, Ph.D. in Psycology and later under S. M. Farrel, M.S.W., also at Kingston Penitentiary. Extensive experience during the past 13 years in close co-operation with Aftercare Agencies working for the rehabilitation of offenders. Promotion to Assistant Deputy Warden (Inmate Training) at Joyceville Institution, at which time, became responsible for the co-ordination of the Treatment and Training Program at the Medium Security Institution at Joyceville.

- (b) Deputy Superintendent, E. E. Boyce: High School graduate; 15 years administration and supervisory experience in the R.C.A.F.; and six years ago appointed Deputy Superintendent of Prison for Women.
