I agree that we have made some very important decisions in favour of regional economic development in Western Canada and the Atlantic provinces, and we will certainly do the same tomorrow, to the great satisfaction of Mr. Bourassa and, who knows, of the Hon. Member for Montreal—Sainte-Marie.

Mr. Malépart: Mr. Speaker, my friend Robert Bourassa may be right when he says that Mr. Bouchard would be a good representative for Quebec in Ottawa, but he overlooked the fact that Mr. Bouchard is running in Lac-Saint-Jean and that he would not be a good representative for Lac-Saint-Jean in Ottawa. What they need is a guy from Lac-Saint-Jean, not a guy from Meech Lake!

WESTERN PROCUREMENT EXPENDITURES

Mr. Don Ravis (Saskatoon East): Mr. Speaker, my question is directed to the Minister of Supply and Services. As the Minister is well aware, his Department spends approximately \$1 billion a year on procurement in the west. However, this is approximately one-third of what the west deserves on a proportionate basis.

The western directorate of the Department indicated in Calgary that the Department is eager to add to its procurement list of expenditures. Can the new Minister indicate what steps he is prepared to take to ensure that this imbalance is corrected?

Hon. Otto Jelinek (Minister of Supply and Services): Mr. Speaker, in fairness, the west was ignored by previous Governments for some 20 years and there is a lot of catching up to do.

The policy and goal backed by this Government are to bring fairness and equal opportunity to all regions of Canada. Some progress has been made. The west received a 20 per cent increase in procurement orders from last year to this year. My colleagues and I, particularly the Minister responsible for western diversification, are working on building on that success. We hope to be making some pretty good announcements in the very near future so that we can meet our goal of bringing fairness and equality to all regions of this country.
