necessity, for such an extraordinary force, is the best possible proof of the justice of their arguments, who represented the peace as neither affording "indemnity for the past," nor security for the future."

Literary and Philosophical Intelligence:

The Royal Society of London has bestowed on Count RUMFORD the first medal awarded from a fund provided by the Count himself for discoveries on the nature and properties of heat.

The Copley-medal has been adjudged to Dr. WOOLLASTON, by whom the Bakerian Lecture for the present year was delivered on the 11th of November; the subject was Horizontal Refraction.

A LAW JOURNAL, to be continued Monthly, on the same active and practical plan as the Medical and Phyfical Journal, will be started on the First of March, under the direction of John Morgan, Elq. a veteran at the Bar, and Recorder of Maidstone, and of THOMAS WALTER WILLIAMS, Efq. author of the Justice of the Peace, and of other valuable works.— It is to consist, 1. Of Reports; 2. Of Valuable Tracts and Communications; 3. Of Reviews of Law Books; and 4. of Commentaries upon all new Statutes. Such materials, put together with the ability that may be expected from the editors, will render the projected Journal indispensable to the office and library of every professor of the law in the united kingdom.

A finall volume of Poems will shortly appear, containing an Estay on War, in blank verse, and Hannington Green, &c. in rhyme, written by M. NATHANIEL BLOOMERELD, brother to the author of the Farmer's Boy.

M. Aldini, Profesior at the Institute of Bologna, and nephew of the celebrated Galvani, has vilited this metropolis, and given an accurate account of his experiments and discoveries to the Royal Society, before whom the fame was read on the 25th By the various experiments exhibited by this gentleman, both at London and Oxford, he has established the fact, that Galvanism is animal electricity, not merely passive, but probably performing that most important functions in the animal economy. A feries of experiments made by this fearned Profession shews the eminent and superior power of Galvanism, beyond that of any other stimulant in nature; and it is hoped that it may be applied for the benefit of mankind in diforders of the head, and in apoplexies. Galvanism has been successfully applied in melancholic infanity. Two perfons have been curen by it at Bologna.

Dr. Bostock, of Liverpool, has analized the faline fubfrance which is frequently found on the infide of walls of newly-built houses, and finds it to be the fulphate of magnesia, or Epsom falt, in an almost perfectly pure state.

The vaccine-inoculation has been successfully introduced at Bastora, Bagdad, and several other places in the East. At Bastora, the British Conful set the first example, by causing his own son to be inoculated by Dr. Milne, physician to the factory in the course of a few weeks, the operation had been successfully performed on upwards of forty subjects.

Citizen CLAVIER will shortly publish a French Translation of Herodotus. BARBIE DU BOCAGE, who drew the Maps for Barthelemy's Anacharsis, has undertaken the geographical part of the work. He has already collected excellent materials for the plans and maps that are to accompany the text.
