The sole head or a ramily, or any male over eighteen years old, may homestead a quarter-section of available Dominion land in 1 anitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in persons at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the district. Entry by prexy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency (but not Sub-Agency) on certain conditions.

Duties—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least eighty acres, on certain conditions. A habitable house is required, except where residence is performed in the vicinity.
