WESTERN ATHLETES WIN A. A. U. TITLES

Finn Beat Millard in Sensational Five Mile Run-American Championship.

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., Aug. 7.— thletes of the Olympic Club, San Francisco, won the senior A.A.U. track and field championship at the Panama-Pacific Exposition today. They scored 30 points, six more than the Irish-American Athletic Club of New York. The Illinois Athletic Club was third, with 21 points; the Chicago Athletic Association had 17; Kansas City A.C., 13; University of Wisconsin, 11; Los Angeles A.C., 10; Multnomah A.C., 10; New York A.C., 9, and University of Chicago, 7.

The most sensational race of the day was the five-mile run, which was won by H. Kohlemainen of the Irish-American A.C. of New York, by less than a foot from Oliver Millard of the Olympic Club of this city. The summary:
