The military work of the Y.M.C.A. in the Canadian front was concentrated in the Red Triangle, had first begun in Niagara Camp, in Canada. In the United States the idea of Y.M.C.A. work in the Canadian front was conceived in Canada at the time of the Spanish-American war.

During the present year \$75,000,000 was being gathered for Y.M.C.A. work among the allied armies, and it is estimated that when the soldiers returned from the war they would have altered views regarding religious denominationalism.
