GRAIN GROWERS IN WEST

ARE AGAINST CALDER

Moose Jaw. Sask.. June 13.—The Grain Growers' convention assembled here today unanimously passed a resolution disapproving the stand taken by the Hon. J. A. Calder on the tariff question, in his reply to Hon. T. A. Crear. A telegram was sent at the same time to the latter, approving his stand on the budget debate.

The convention which was a short one, came to a conclusion at midnight, after a more or less stormy debate, and decided by a majority of sixty-three against forty to postpone the nominations of a candidate until
