RY. MEN'S DEMANDS WOULD BREAK ROADS

given in the United States, and, therefore, in Canada; no loss of earnings to the employees, nor savings to the railway will result, since the board has given specific assurance that such American adjustments, if made, and when applied in Canada, will be retro-active to May 1 of this year. This means that the men would receive back pay to make up the difference between what they are now earning and what they would have earned since May 1 on any higher rate of pay adopted as a result of the American negotiations.

"The board has the following very grave conditions to face: "First: The alarming increase in the ratio of operating expenses to gross earnings of all Canadian railways makes it impossible for any further increase in such expenses to be allowed unless the increase is accompanied by still greater increases in freight rates than would otherwise be necessary. "Second: Any concession in the present instance, and its accompanying increase in freight rates must place all Canadian production under a handicap until the same increases in wages, and therefore its prevailing been put into effect in the United States.

"The force of this argument has been recognized in that the Dominion government on July 27 last year authorized an increase in Canadian freight rates to approximate the higher American freight rates then prevailing in order that the railways might pay in Canada the higher rates of wages which had been placed in effect on the American railways under the name of the McCauley award. "The principle was also admitted by the body of employees now threatening to strike in that they, also then discussing strike measures, finally awaited last year the American decision and accepted it."

G. A. C. CHARTER IN FULL SWING

Full Roster of Dominion Officers Elected to Posts.

S. J. Brown was last night elected president and W. J. Carmichael was elected Dominion organizer of the Grand Army of Canada at last night's Dominion chapter of the association. The office of president was keenly contested, Comrade H. W. Parsons being Comrade Brown's chief opponent. R. C. Wood, managing editor of The Grand Army Journal; W. J. Carmichael, Dominion organizer, and H. W. Parsons, W. E. Surtees, R. Cross and Comrades Ritchie, Sloan (Hamilton), MacDuff (Montreal), Lou Marsh, Morgan, Cross, Elise and Arms were elected to the Dominion executive. Comrade William E. Collier, well-known Montreal newspaperman, and secretary of Vimy Post, Montreal, declined office because he was scheduled for a trip to Siberia. Two very popular acclamations were those of Comrade Harcourt to the secretaryship, vice Comrade Carmichael, and Comrade Hugh McLeod as treasurer. Comrade Wright of Niagara Falls, a veteran with 42 years' army service, who had sent six sons to the war, was among the visitors.

GRIEVANCES STILL UNSETTLED.

Another conference is to be held this morning between the packers and the butcher workers, relative to the differences between the employees and the men. Yesterday's conference was without result, one of the five concerns standing out flatly against the men. The executive of the Butcher Workers' Union still has power to call a strike on Monday or Tuesday if such a course is deemed advisable.

HOUSING OF GIRLS BECOMES PROBLEM

Committee From Many Societies to Approach Housing Commissioners.

In response to an invitation sent out by Lady Falconer, president Local Council of Women, Rev. Peter Bryce, past president of the Neighborhood Workers' Association, and Miss Margaret Davidson, honorary president Canadian Business Women's Club, a meeting of persons interested in housing conditions in Toronto was held in the social service building of the university last night. Rev. Peter Bryce was elected to the chair, and stated that the object of the call was to confer on a very important matter of national warfare. The chairman stated that he had found that there are about 50,000 business women in Toronto, 10,000 of whom are away from their homes. Of these about 1000 are housed by the Y. W. C. A. and kindred associations, the other 9000 have to find shelter in boarding houses. This had given rise to a serious situation, said the speaker, who demonstrated the point by the experience of a clergyman who on enquiring from a company of thirty girls what accommodation they had for receiving their men friends was told by 27 that the only place they had was their bedroom. Miss Davidson told of an investigation begun twelve years ago in which boarding-house keepers had sometimes been found to be extortionate, and general conditions made it necessary for women coming from good homes in the country to lower their standard of living. Later she had visited houses for women in the United States, some of which were magnificent. Her survey led her to favor the apartment house, which idea had later been carried out by the Local Council of Women, when that body under its president, Mrs. Huestis, took over the Aberdeen Apartments on Bain avenue. Here from 65 to 80 business women were in residence.

Religious Minimum.

Dr. Gordon Bates described the homelike atmosphere of the Elizabeth Summer House in Washington for women. Rev. Mr. Moore of St. George's parish said that the factory girl was the one who needed particular attention. Toronto was a manufacturing centre, and was becoming more so every day. Two years ago he had asked Canadian girls to send out one hundred circulars, asking for names of those who could take girls into their homes. He received only five or six replies. He believed the thing wanted was small houses to accommodate ten or fifteen women. He did not believe any house could be run successfully unless it was governed by the minimum of religious rules. Different types of houses were described by Mrs. Huestis, and of a group in Philadelphia which included 278 houses, one apartment house and a hotel. She thought there was a need in Toronto where such a group might be erected. On the part of the Y. W. C. A., Mrs. Stark promised to co-operate with any body of workers who would find suitable houses that might be rented. The Y. W. C. A. would pay the rent and manage the house.

Advocate Suburbs.

A plan to convert the Parkdale Assembly Hall into a house for women was offered by Mr. Masten, and Mr. Phelps advocated houses with pleasant environment in the suburbs. That the housing problem for low wage girls would never be solved on the basis of profit, was the opinion of Mr. Somerville, who gave an account of several classes of houses in the United States. Information as to the attitude of the Toronto Housing Commission on the question, was asked by Sir John Willison. He was in favor of small garden suburb communities. The discussion ended by a resolution moved by Professor McIvor, asking that a committee be appointed to wait upon the Toronto Housing Commission, pointing out that the meeting was much impressed with need for houses for single women in business and industry, and asking that attention be directed to different types of houses, particularly the committee and apartment house. The committee names were Rev. Peter Bryce, chairman; Prof. McIvor, Rev. Canon Ingles, Mrs. Huestis, Dr. Gordon Bates, Mrs. Torrington, Miss Davidson.

Think Former New Yorker Could Tell About Wheel

Hamilton, June 13.—Henry Maher, who stated that he lived in New York, was arrested tonight on a charge of vagrancy. According to the police Maher could not give a satisfactory explanation of a wheel which he was attempting to sell.

PEACE TREATY WILL BE REWRITTEN

Financial Clauses Will Be Amended to Allow the Commission Certain Discretion.

Paris, June 13.—The peace treaty with Germany will be entirely rewritten and reprinted for the incorporation textually of the explanations and clarifications contained in the all-repudiated German counter-proposal. The council of four today devoted both of its sessions to the revision of the text of the treaty. Many of the divergences from the old text in the new treaty are of a minor nature, but some are highly important. This is notably true of the second paragraph of article 232, where the English text of the old document limited compensation Germany was to make to damages done to the civilian population of the allied and associated powers and to their property during the period of the belligerency of each as an allied or associated power against Germany. This wording excluded American losses during the period of the neutrality of the United States and Italian losses during the time when Italy was at war with Austria but not with Germany. The French text, however, contained no such limit clause. The reparations clause will go into the new treaty virtually unchanged. Other sections of the treaty, however, will be rewritten. The treaty may make some slight changes regarding the disposition of certain of the contested districts on the Belgo-German frontier. The financial clauses will be amended to give the reparations commission discretion to authorize Germany to raising working capital for restarting industries and enable her to pay her reparations.
