"We are now having a most careful survey of the province made. There is indication of a good supply of feed located one or two other good spots in the northern districts.
"I really believe that it will necessary to ship in hay from the east this winter. Ontario and Quebec have

large hay crops, and it will be a mat-ter of arranging rates. Manitoba will have a good heavy crop of straw."

Must Sell Stock. Mr. Mars all fears also that it will be necessary for many of the live stock men to throw their animals on the market this fall. "This would be the market this fall. "This would be almost disastrous," said the minister. "but if the cost of feed is going to be. higher than the value of the stock, then what are they to do? "Of course, if good rains were to
