It was at that time considered too progressive, but The World is glad to see that Hon. Mr. Lemieux, the postmaster-general, has practically came to this view, and the following despatch from Ottawa will be read with pleasure by all the people in the suburbs of To-ronto, and especially by the people of Toronto Junction, where, by the way, the patronage in connection with the the patronage in connection with the appointment of carriers, etc., will be in the hands of A. Rodolphe Lemieux, postmaster-general, has authorized the introduction of free delivery by letter carrier in Toronto Junction, the service to be inaugurated as soon as the necessary equipment can be made and cessary equipment can be made and organization effected. The free deorganization effected. The free de-livery district of Toronto is also to be gradually extended on the north to St. Clair-avenue and on the east to the eastern boundary of East To-ronto, the area of free delivery to in-clude the suburban districts known as Davenport, Bracondale, Wychwood Park, Deer Park, Doncaster, Todmor-den Coleman Norway and the towden, Coleman, Norway and the town of East Toronto. Except in the case of isolated houses or districts causing excessive travel a free delivery service is to be established over the whole of this large metropolitan area. Letters prepaid for special delivery will not be delivered beyond present city limits."


