The stock market was subjected to heavy profit taking as well as to bearish operations based on some apprehension of stiffer money rates created by the character of Saturday's bank statement. Numerous stoploss orders were uncovered and selling on this account added an element of weakness. The announcement in the course of the market that gold had been engaged in large amounts in London for shipment to the United States checked the early decline and led to a rally. In the afternoon prices again went off and the close was not far from the lowest of the day. The losses extended to about 2 per cent. in Union Pacifics, B.Q., St. Paul, Sugar, A.M.T., B.R. T. and some of the specialties. Losses of 1 per cent, and over were common. The market closed heavy and somewhat unsettied. Government bonds were unchanged. Railway bonds were generally lower. EXPERIMENTAL FARM CROPS.

Wheat Crop Very Heavy in the Northwest-Average Thirty Bush-

Winnipeg, Man. Aug. 29.-(C.P.R. Press despatches.)-Prof. Saunders, director of experimental farms, returned east yesterday from his annual inspec-tion of western experimental farms and

tion of western experimental farms and crops,

1 rof. Robertson says: "In the Northwest Territories I found the wheat crop very heavy, especially in the Indian Head district. I drove nearly forty miles through the district and examined a great many crops, and I think that it is not placing too high an estimate on that district to say that they will have in the neighborhood of thirty bushels to the acre on an average on all the summer fallowed land and twenty to twenty-five bushels on spring plowing and stubble.

stubble.

"In Manitoba I have seen a great deal of the crop, having traveled nearly all across the province in daylight. From what I learned in coming through yesterday and the day before, I think that there is, at the present time, about two-thirds of grain crop cut, and that the estimate the Government have made of about 17 1-2 bushels to the acre will be fully realized. The crops will not average that west of Brandon, but east of Brandon, in my opinion, they will go considerable over that, in many instances running as high as 20 to 25 bushels, Quality of the grain seems to be exceptionally good this year; the kernel is plump and bright, and farmers everywhere are thoroughly well satisfied with the prospects before them. The weather has been for the most part very favorable for harvesting operations, and cutting is proceeding very rapidly.
"I find that there is an increase of interest every year in tree growing for shelter and ornamentation of farms."

The crops at the experimental farms, both at Brandon and Indian Head, will average much heavier than average crops of farmers. The wheat at the

average much heavier than average crops of farmers. The wheat at the Brandon farm is expected to average about thirty bushels and the oats seventy-five to eighty.
