Dr. Niven, chairman of the board of health, is quoted as saying that he thinks we should have meat inspection by a qualified inspector, but as such is not at hand he would offer two hundred dollars to the present dairy and when necessary, making a microscopic examination of such. To do this to such. It would therefore be necessary to offer him a salary commensurrange from \$1,200 to \$1,500 per annum

to start with. The board of health can rest assured that when the citizens of London realize that from 10 to 12 per cent of the hogs slaughtered in this district are affected with tuberculosis and that the same disease is very prevalent in our cattle, they will insist on a thorough inspection of all meat sold in the city of London, and the stamping of the same at time of slaughter, showing that it has been inspected and passed according to regulations governing the same.
