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ROSE DAY IN AID OF TUBERCULAR POOR TO BE ON SATURDAY

The Women's Sanatorium Aid Society To Conduct Annual Drive.

Saturday, May 31, will be the annual "rose day" of the Women's Sanatorium Aid Society. The proceeds of the day will be used in previous years to aid the tubercular poor in homes of the city.

The objective this year has been set at \$3,000, but slightly more than that amount will be required to supply medical attention, food and proper nourishment, which are important in the treatment of the disease. In addition, two nurses are employed continuously visiting the homes, and clinics are also provided Tuesday and Thursday of each week at Victoria Hospital. An illustration of the amount of money needed may be found in the fact that the daily amount of milk used is 40 quarts.

The funds are especially low this year owing to the influenza epidemic, expenditures. In some cases whole families were ill, and extra bedding and food was required and provided.

The headquarters of the "rose day" drive will be at the Victoria Hotel, Dominion Savings Building, King street, at Richmond street. The workers may attend a meeting at the Victoria Hotel, at 10 o'clock, on Friday, so that they may be ready for an early start Saturday.

EXPORTERS ADVISED NOW IS BEST TIME TO PUSH BUSINESS

Europe Short of Nearly All Kinds of Goods.

Much interest is being awakened among local manufacturers in the question of export trade owing to the fact that Europe is short of nearly all kinds of goods.

Mr. C. G. Dodge of the London Chamber of Commerce, who has recently returned from a tour of inspection in Lyons, France, in conference with the export committee of the London Chamber of Commerce, stated that there is a scarcity of every line of goods in European markets, and that the time for Canadian manufacturers to make their goods known to the world is now.

With regard to the best methods of promoting export trade, they advise that, where possible, personal visits and the employment of a representative on the spot, who can become personally acquainted with the goods he is to sell, is the best method.

City Representatives Asked By Telephone, To Go To Toronto Wednesday.

The city council and the utilities commission probably will be represented at a meeting which has been called for 2 o'clock tomorrow, when the city council will discuss the matter of the hydro-electric commission for increased rates.
