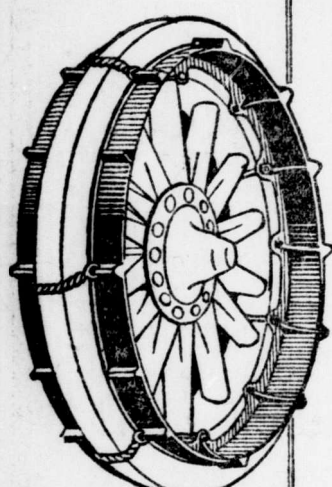

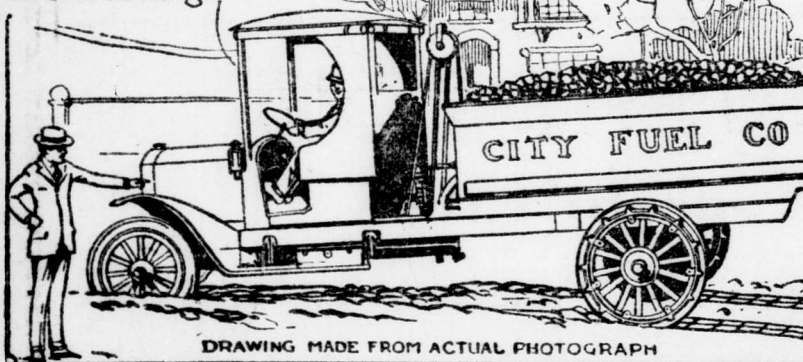

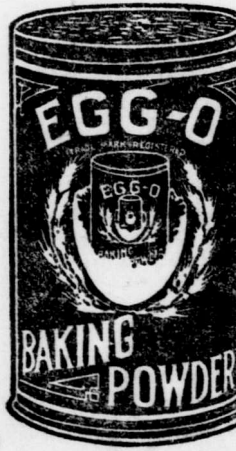

GOVERNMENT WINS BUT TWO OUT OF 7 BY-ELECTIONS

Ernest Lapointe Secures Great Victory in E. Quebec.

[Special to The Advertiser.]

OTTAWA, Oct. 27.—Threats of dissolution on the double issue of senate reform and public ownership in the event of the Upper House killing the Grand Trunk bill have not been taken very seriously either by the members of the chamber in question, or by those of the Commons. They were treated with contempt tonight in view of the result of the first test at the federal polls since the election of 1917.

News of the utter defeat of the Government's candidates in Carlton, N. B., and Glenagarry at the hands of farmer candidates, coupled with the overwhelming victory of Ernest Lapointe, the Liberal candidate in Quebec East, came to the attention of the Government early in the evening.

The defeat of Col. Melville, the Government nominee in the former constituency, was all the more humiliating from the fact that it was Arthur Meighen, fresh from his sponsorship of the Grand Trunk bill, and Hon. P. E. Blondin, postmaster-general, of shoot holes in the British flag fame, had campaigned in the district and had peddled the stock in trade of Union Government throughout the polling division.

To assist General Harvey in Glenagarry no speaker on the Government side could be found, and he was apparently permitted to go to his fate unassisted. Just why Hon. P. E. Blondin did not go down to Quebec East to campaign against his old enemy, Ernest Lapointe, has not been explained.

Later in the evening news of the passing of the Unionist constituency of Assiniboia into the hands of the former candidate commenced to come in. It was no comfort to the Government that Hon. W. R. Motherwell, the Liberal candidate, had been defeated by Mr. Gould.

At this time of writing it would appear that Hon. Dr. Tolmie, minister of agriculture, had been elected by a majority of approximately 2,000. It is a significant fact, however, that Dr. Tolmie, before he became a member of the present Government, was elected in 1917 by over 5,000 of a majority.

That there should be such a cutting down of a majority in such a constituency as Victoria is something which cannot be looked upon with alarm by the administration.

As an indication of the Government's loss of popularity, it may be noted that in 1917 John McMartin, Unionist candidate in Glenagarry, was elected by acclamation; that in Carlton Hon. F. B. Carvell, Unionist candidate, was also elected by acclamation; and that in Assiniboia Hon. J. C. Turfitt, Unionist candidate, secured over four thousand of a majority.

The first test since 1917 has not been fortunate for the Government. Out of seven seats it has won two, namely Kingston and Victoria, and in both cases promises of contracts for harbor works, docks and railway equipment figured largely.

Deny Hamilton Seat Has Been Offered to London ex-Member.

JOINT CAUCUS TODAY

U. F. O. Expected to Announce Name of Leader On Wednesday.

TORONTO, Oct. 27.—Political matters were quiet here today. A good deal of interest is being taken in the joint caucus of the United Farmers of Ontario and Labor delegates set for tomorrow, as upon the result of this conference much will depend. It is generally believed that some sort of a "deal" will be made whereby the United Farmers and Labor M. P. elect can work together in the Legislature, and that Labor will have at least two cabinet ministers in the U. F. O. Government.

The real interest in coming events is in the Wednesday gathering of the United Farmers. It is expected that they will announce the name of their leader on Wednesday, and possibly the personnel of the entire cabinet. Prior to the general meeting of the U. F. O. members-elect on Wednesday there will be a conference of the Labor members-elect, and the results of the deliberations of each of these parties will go to make up the official announcement which is expected from the U. F. O. So far as can be learned, the Labor men are working amicably with the farmers, and the prospects are favorable for a harmonious conclusion to the present negotiations.

The Hearst Government held another cabinet meeting today with only routine business transacted thereat. It seems to be a case of simply waiting until the U. F. O. announcement is made, so far as the Government is concerned, but it is thought that as the fiscal year of the province ends on Friday, Oct. 31, the present ministry may make its hat and walk out that day.

Labor men in Hamilton deny the report that the Hamilton seat has been offered to Sir Adam Beck. They say that Sir Adam Beck is not acceptable either to the U. F. O. or to Labor as premier. They profess to think that Beniah Bowman, the Manitoulin farmer, will be selected as premier.

A call has been sent out by Sergeant Major MacNamara, M. P. elect of this city, to all the soldier members of the Legislature to meet in Toronto next Monday to consider the question of forming a soldiers' group in the Legislature.

15 Ships Delivered Under Gov't. Ship-building Program

OTTAWA, Oct. 27.—The program of ship construction undertaken by the Dominion Government early in 1918 has yielded substantial results. To date fifteen ships have been delivered and are already in service under the direction of the Canadian National Railways.

When the present Government ship-building plan is completed sixty vessels will be in service. These will have a dead weight tonnage of about 325,000 tons.

The bottoms of Canadian shipping have brought some 35,000 tons of sugar from Cuba. This averted a real shortage, as private ships were unobtainable.

DORCHESTER ANNIVERSARY. DORCHESTER, Oct. 27.—Anniversary services were held in the Methodist Church Sunday. Rev. Mr. McKinley of Hyatt Avenue Church, London, preached both morning and evening, and special music was rendered by the choir.

HOPES OF "WET" SPELL IN U. S. ARE SHATTERED

Wilson Vetoes "Dry" Measure, House Passes It Over His Veto.

SENATE WILL FOLLOW

Expect to Act On the Bill by Wednesday at Latest.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Oct. 27.—President Wilson unexpectedly vetoed the prohibition enforcement bill today and within three hours the House of Representatives had repassed it over his veto by a vote of 176 to 55. The total vote was barely more than a majority of the entire membership.

"Dry" leaders in the Senate immediately began laying plans to repass the bill there. They expect to ask unanimous consent for its consideration tomorrow, claiming enough votes to put it through. They expect to act on it by Wednesday.

The president refused to sign the bill because it incidentally enforced the war-time prohibition.

Objects Satisfied. The object of war-time prohibition, the president said in his veto, had been satisfied and "sound public policy makes clear the reason and necessity for its repeal."

It would not be difficult, the president held, for Congress to deal separately with the two issues.

The veto hit Congress like a crack of lightning. It was the first time since the president again, deserted its leaders, who wanted to defer consideration until tomorrow.

But the drys swept into the chamber and showed there was an overwhelming majority in favor of giving the Government ample weapons for dealing with the liquor traffic now outlawed throughout the land.

Was Unexpected. Nobody had really expected to know that the president would veto the bill. Republicans and Democrats alike, and the countless multitude that had so far watched the passing of the bill, thought it would become a law without his signature.

Attorney-General Palmer, it was stated, had declared it constitutional. But the president, propped up in bed, dictated and then signed the veto message, and sent it along to Congress, without worrying apparently about what Congress might do.

With repassage of the law by the House and the prospect of the same thing happening in the Senate, hope of the big "wet spell" that would run over the Christmas season vanished into thin air.

Prohibition leaders tonight predicted that the refusal of the House to accept the president's veto meant that the sale of liquor would not be permitted again in the life of this and many other generations.

THREE LOSE LIVES IN ST. LAWRENCE STORM; SURVIVOR IS RESCUED

QUEBEC, Oct. 27.—Three men lost their lives when a schooner was wrecked in the storm on the St. Lawrence River, barely five miles from Quebec harbor during the night of Friday and Saturday, and a fourth victim was rescued unconscious after having been lashed to the mast of the vessel for the entire night. Pierre Dion, aged 70, an old navigator, was taking his schooner down from Quebec to the Island of Orleans. He had with him his two nephews, Xavier and Jos. Dion, both the fathers of large families, and a younger relative.
