DOWN 2 CENTS

Indications Are That Quotations Will Be Materially Lower.

Creamery butter is down 2c per lb. and indications point to still lower prices. The situation centres around the increased production of butter caused by condensers which are now manufacturing butter instead of milk powder and other products. Indications point to materially lower prices for butter in the next few months.  
A lessened demand for oats brought

prices down, and most sales were made at from \$1.80 to \$1.90 per cwt; bushel quotations are 61 1/2 to 64 1/2; several loads of oats were sold, and from indications they will not be any higher this week.

Chicago, Oct. 22.—Wheat prices advanced briskly today after a weak start. Reports of liberal European buying were chiefly responsible for the rally. Uncertainty regarding British strike troubles, together with bearish crop advices from Argentina, had a good deal to do with initial declines. Opening quotations, which varied from unchanged figures to 2c lower, with December at \$1.96 1/2 to 1.97 1/2, and March at \$1.89 1/2 to 1.90 1/2, were followed by a period of wavering, and then by a decided upturn all around to well above yesterday's finish.  
Corn paralleled the action of wheat. After opening 1/4c off to 1/2c advance, including December at 74 1/2 to 75 1/2, the market sagged a little more and then scored substantial gains.  
Oats were governed by the action of other grains, starting unchanged to 1/4c higher for December at 52 1/2 to 53 1/2, and underling a moderate general setback, but later recovering.
