HAMILTON FOLK HEARS TO BIG ENGLISH ESTATE

Hope to Share in 750 Millions—St. Mary's Cathedral Jubilee—Disorderly House Raided.

HAMILTON, Feb. 14.—(Special.)—At midnight Saturday the police raided 344 North East-avenue and arrested Mrs. William Fralick, her husband and Lillie Boughner, Annie Armstrong, Annie Butler and Marie Lester.

DON'T WANT SCINE NETS TO SPOIL THAMES FISHING

Largely Attended Mass Meeting at London Passes Resolution for Guidance of Government.

LONDON, Feb. 14.—(Special.)—On the rumor that the Ontario Government intends re-issuing seine licenses, a fishing privilege that has now been withheld for two years, a rousing meeting of protest was held on Saturday evening at the city hall under the auspices of the Ontario Fish and Game Protective Association.

The hall was crowded, some placing the attendance as high as 750, and the enthusiasm evoked was remarkable. A notable feature of the gathering was the fact that the members of the association formed hardly 10 per cent of the attendance, the great majority being composed of mechanics and laborers, each for the members of the association formed hardly 10 per cent of the attendance.

Hon. Adam Beck, who presided, expressed himself strongly in favor of the objects of the meeting. He read a telegram telling of an informal meeting of farmers and mechanics held at Chatham at the same time, demanding equal fishing rights for all and no class legislation.

The speakers at the London meeting were H. Marshall Smith, barrister (London), Wm. Smith, plumber (London), W. H. Stevens (Chatham), and A. Kelly Evans of Toronto. Graydon urged that the old English common law idea that riparian owners should not interfere with the course of a stream should apply equally to the fish contained in the stream.

Whereas owing to the increasing number of boats used for net fishing and the extravagantly large quantities of fish caught by nets, these natural rights and inalienable privileges of the people along the River Thames were destroyed and fishing by hook and line was practically done away with for many years.

WINDSOR'S POWER PROBLEM

WINDSOR, Feb. 14.—(Special.)—Windsor will not take Niagara power until the situation is cleared up concerning the operation of the private gas plant in this city.

Mr. A. D. Shephard, chairman of the special power committee, says so, and matters are at a standstill. Nearly two years ago Windsor tried hard to gain control of the lighting service, but a majority of the aldermen passed a bylaw giving the Windsor Gas Co. a fifteen years' franchise, whereby the city agreed to forego expropriation until that time, and the company slightly decreased gas rates.

A bylaw was finally passed, just before the municipal election of a year ago, and in that campaign Arch. McNeen promised to take immediate steps to secure municipal ownership if elected. He was elected, but he has not yet taken any action.
