The sole head of a family, or any male ver 18 years old, may homestead a uarter-section of available Dominion nd in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alherta. Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency (but not Sub-Agency) on certain conditions.

Duties.—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres, on certain con-ditions. A habitable house is required, except where residence is performed in the vicinity.

Live stock may be substituted for cul-

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Price, \$3.00 per lacre.
