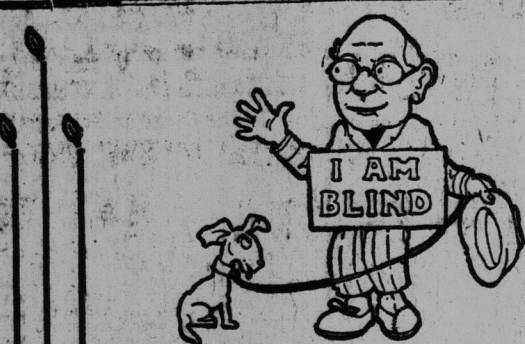

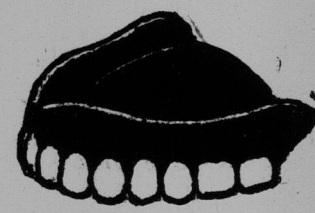

JERSEY CITY SCOTTISH RITE MASONS BUILD FINE TEMPLE

Today Masons Held an All Day Session at Their New Home and Conferred Degrees on a Class of 200—An Example for St. John Masons.

Mayor Sears has received a copy of the Evening Journal of Jersey City, which contains an excellent cut of the new masonic temple, which is to be opened there this evening. The Journal says: "In celebration of the opening of the new temple being erected by the bodies of the Ancient Accepted Scottish Rite of Freemasonry of this city in Park street, on Tuesday, May 28, special meetings will be held all day on that day at the new building, at which special indulgences will be conferred by the various degree bodies of the Scottish Rite on a class of about 200 candidates.

"These indulgences will allow the candidates to assume the several degrees in one evening, which would otherwise take months to receive. Among the candidates will be several prominent citizens of this city and the work of the various bodies will be watched by high degree Masons from all over the state.

"The programme for the day will be quite elaborate, and the occasion will be a gala one. The first meeting at which the Jersey City Lodge of Perfection will confer from the fourth to the fourteenth degrees on the candidates, will be called to order at 1 o'clock in the afternoon. When the work of that lodge has been finished the Jersey City Council of the Principles of Jerusalem will meet and confer the fifteenth and sixteenth degrees. The meetings of the Jersey City Chapter of Rose Croix at which the candidates will receive the seventeenth and eighteenth degrees, will be the final one of the afternoon session and it will be followed by a dinner to the candidates and the invited guests in the banquet hall on the first floor, which will be served by Steward Giannini.

"In the evening the highest body of the Scottish Rite, the New Jersey Consistory, will confer from the nineteenth to the thirty-third degrees on the class with all the attending ceremony. This session will be the most interesting of the day, and it is expected that every member of the Rite in this city will be present. The meeting will be followed by a collation after which there will be an informal post-prandial programme.

"It is quite probable that the new building will not be thoroughly ready for dedication until about the middle of September, at which time impressive ceremonies will be held.

ornamented with two bronze columns with three electric light globes on each. When once the building is entered the entire scheme of architecture is apparent. It is severely classic and gains much of its impressiveness from its beautiful, simple lines; the contractors and architects have grasped the idea of the true beauty of the building and have given the members a structure, which for beauty of workmanship, adaptability for their every need and completeness of detail is not approached by any Scottish Rite Temple in the United States.

"The first floor is devoted to the secretary's office, cloak rooms, kitchen and a banquet room, of which the beamed ceiling is of red and gold, above the floor, and will seat over five hundred people. The main staircase is double and leads from the right and left of the lobby to the mezzanine floor, where are found the library and candidates' parlor.

"One short flight up are the members' parlors and the main auditorium with vaulted ceiling twenty-five feet high, a most commodious stage to the east, and to the west the organ balcony, a harmony of red and gold, also feature being the great organ with twenty-seven feet frontage, built by Midmer & Sons, and one of the finest instruments ever turned out by them.

"The stage has been most completely equipped by Toomey & Volland, scenic artists of St. Louis, Missouri, with some fifty drops and their accessories, notably a beautiful drop curtain of red plush with gold embroidery. The dressing rooms—which are very large and fully equipped—are under the stage.

"The second mezzanine floor is devoted to a lodge room, with proper parlors, etc., which the trustees intend to rent exclusively to Masonic bodies now meeting in the various halls in Jersey City, and for which they have a great many applications. The building is most tastefully furnished in hand embroidered leather and oak, with rich and beautiful hangings.

"Its site is most accessible from all directions, being only twelve minutes from a lodge room, with proper parlors, etc., and five minutes from the Newark Branch of the Central Railroad of New Jersey, and the trolley cars from Newark, Elizabeth, Bayonne and Hoboken, etc., pass within one hundred and fifty feet of the door.

"The building is being erected by the Scottish Rite Association of New Jersey."

THE STORY IS DENIED

President Melen Says the Pennsylvania Road Will Not Have a Line to St. John.

New Haven, Conn., May 27—Owing to the fact that President C. S. Melen is at Stockbridge (Mass.), no statement could be secured from him today in this city relative to the reported formation of a merger or working agreement between the New York, New Haven & Hartford and the Pennsylvania Railroad, which would give the Pennsylvania control of lines from the central west and the gulf to St. John (N. B.). From another high official source, however, an absolute and unqualified denial was made. Such a thing, it was stated, not only not being fact but not even having been talked of. The denial can be regarded as authoritative.
