In early life Brother HARRINGTON, entered the Navy as a profession, but subsequently on coming to Canada, he was induced to leave it and enter the Civil Service, where he rose, through his sterling worth, to the high and responsible position of Deputy Receiver General of the Dominion of Canada.

When a young man Brother HARRINGTON was initiated into the mysteries of Freemasonry under the Grand Lodge of England, and for many years he held the high position of Provincial Grand Master for Quebec, under that Grand Lodge.

At the Union of the Craft of Upper and Lower Canada, under the United Grand Lodge of Canada, he, by his counsel and co-operation assisted materially in bringing about the peaceful solution of the then existing difficulties, and subsequently was elected second Grand Master of that Grand Lodge.

He, for many years, held the office of Grand Z of the Grand Royal Arch Chapter of Canada, and also that of Grand Sub Prior of Knights Templar.

Brother HARRINGTON was ardently devoted to the Craft, and profoundly versed in Masonic lore. He was highly esteemed for his sterling worth and his genial characteristics by all who knew him, and will ever be held by us in revered and grateful remembrance as a staunch and true-hearted friend; and our consolation rests in the knowledge that he died at a ripe age, after a life of usefulness and honor.

The vacancy thus caused will, in accordance with the Constitution, be filled by the Lieutenant Grand Commander, Ill.°. Bro.°. W. H. HUTTON, 33°, until the Annual meeting in October.
