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

Premier J. B. M. Baxter received official word today that a check for \$288,000 had been received from the Canadian National Railway management covering a payment in lieu of taxes for the years 1925 and 1926. At the inter-provincial conference of pre-miers several months ago, an agree-ment was reached with the C. N. R. for annual payments to the three Mari-time Provinces where C. N. R. prop-erty cannot be taxed owing to the original provisions in the construction of the old Intercolonial Railway. The sum agreed on for New Brunswick was \$119,000 a year. It is understood that Nova Scotia and Prince Edward Island have also received their checks.
