RIGHT OF WAY TO FALLS LOOKOUT IS AGREED UPON

J. Fraser Gregory Makes Statement to City Council Board

That he hoped eventually the city would take over the boulevard along the shore at Prospect Point and the street leading to it, but until this was done he was willing to give the city a right of way from year to year, with the street leading to the falls. This was the statement made this morning by J. Fraser Gregory to the members of the Common Council when the matter was under discussion in committee. The City Solicitor will be asked to draw a resolution for the taking over of the street leading from Douglas Avenue through the Murray & Gregory property, and Mr. Gregory is to submit his offer in connection with the right of way to the shore in writing for the next meeting of the council.

Commissioner Frink said he had discussed with Mr. Gregory the suggestion of Mayor White that while the street from Douglas Avenue was being taken over provision be made for the right of way so that tourists would be able to view the falls from this point. On the plan of Mr. Gregory there were reserved two streets leading to a boulevard around the shore and Mr. Gregory was willing to give the city a right of way over these proposed streets and the boulevard.

TAKE OVER STREET

Mr. Gregory said he was willing to give the city this right of way from year to year, but he had no hope that the city would take over these two streets and the boulevard and fix the latter up for the accommodation of tourists.

The Mayor asked if the public had any rights there now, and Mr. Gregory said they had not, but he had no desire to stop them from viewing the falls from this point.

The Mayor said that all he wanted was an assurance that the public would not at some future date be shut out from the shore, and Mr. Gregory said this would not be done, as he regarded the boulevard as an asset to his holding.

Commissioner Frink said he would take the matter up with the City Solicitor and have him draft a resolution providing for the taking over of the street from Douglas Avenue and for a right of way to the shore, and report at the next meeting of the council.

C. N. R. CHECK FOR \$238,000 ARRIVES

Province Receives That Sum in Lieu of Taxes on Railroad

Premier J. B. M. Baxter received official word today that a check for \$238,000 had been received from the Canadian National Railway management covering a payment in lieu of taxes for the years 1925 and 1926. At the inter-provincial conference of premiers several months ago, an agreement was reached with the C. N. R. for annual payments to the Maritime Provinces where C. N. R. property cannot be taxed owing to the original provisions in the construction of the old Intercolonial Railway. The sum agreed on for New Brunswick was \$119,000 a year. It is understood that Nova Scotia and Prince Edward Island have also received their checks.

SAD NEWS RECEIVED

H. S. Robinson of Fairville, is Notified of Sudden Death of Father in U. S.

Sad news came by telegram to Herman S. Robinson, 20 Main street, Fairville, announcing the death of his father, William F. Robinson, which occurred suddenly on Tuesday in Somerville, Mass. He left for Somerville on receipt of the message and expects to arrive in Fairville on Friday morning to view his father's body. Funeral arrangements will then be made. Mr. Robinson was born in Saint John and removed to the United States 30 years ago and practised his profession as civil engineer. He spent several months this summer at the home of his son in Fairville and returned to Somerville only a month ago. Only a little more than a year ago his wife, who was Miss Emma C. Armstrong of Fairville, passed away.

SEE THE FALLS

At high tide the water of the Bay of Fundy reaches a higher level than the water of the Saint John River and flows through the gorge of the Falls, creating a "fall" of water.

At low tide the water in the Bay comes so much lower than that of the river, that the fall of water is reversed and flows down river into the Bay.

At half tide, when the level in the Bay and River are about equal, the Falls disappear entirely, and the water at the Falls becomes smooth as the surface of a lake.

To fully appreciate the wonder of the world it should be seen at all three stages.

The doctor, after working for some hours over S. Weldon, brought her out of the coma into which she had fallen and had the little one removed to the General Hospital. She had so far recovered that she was able to leave that institution today and return to her home.
