6,500 ARE HOMELESS; San Francisco Is Rocked By Three Violent Earthquakes Today PROPERTY DAMAGE IS Sultan and 3 SALE OF NEARLY \$100,000,000 Sons To Marry

Ten Municipalities Completely Wiped Out and Toll of Injured Is Great; 200 Dead in Havana Province Alone

HAVANA, Oct. 22.—Reports of more than 650 persons killed in Wednesday's hurricane, an unknown number of injured, and 6,500 homeless, were mingled with frantic appeals for aid

early this morning. Ten or more towns and villages are said to have been completely destroyed. The damage is estimated to reach nearly \$100,000,000 at various places in the provinces of Havana, Matanzas, Santa Clara and Pinar Del Rio. In Havana alone it is estimated that 200 persons were killed and 1,600 injured, and that 3,200 families had their houses destroyed.
