## BIG RIFLE MEET DRAWS TO CLOSE

Pte. E. J. Pinder Wins the Challenge Cup in Dominion Match.

The annual shoot of the New Brunswick Rifle Association at Sussex is drawing to a close and the final matches will be shot today. The weather conditions yesterday were far from ideal as it was cloudy with high winds and threatening rain during the afternoon.

In the Dominion match the Challenge Cup and \$10 was won by Pte. E. J. Pinder of the York Regt., with a score of 65. Ten teams of five men each entered in the Dominion match and started shooting yesterday afternoon and will conclude the matches today. The cadets assembled yesterday afternoon and shot at 200 yards range to compete for individual prizes and the Major and Strathcona cups. The 200 yard of the Prince of Wales was completed yesterday and the 600 yard commenced when the clouds compelled the rest of the match to be cancelled until today.

There are two Strathcona cups, a senior and junior. The senior cup is only open to cadets from the public schools, while the junior to all cadets from other than public schools. The former was won by Cadet S. Munro of the Fredericton High School, the latter by Cadet Charles F. Toole of the St. Andrews Cadet Corps.

At the conclusion of the shooting this morning a luncheon will be served and the presentation of the prizes will take place at 3.30 o'clock this afternoon.

Mary Browne Leaps From Golf to Tennis and Back Again With Equal Facility



MARY BROWNE, AS A TENNIS PLAYER AND AS A GOLFER. New York, Aug. 8.—Ten years ago Mary Browne of California was good enough to win the national women's tennis championship. Three years ago she was good enough to come out of semi-retirement and again go to the finals in the national where she lost to Molla Malory.

In between times she took up golf and played the ancient game of Scotland as enthusiastically as ever she did the game of tennis. Last winter she was good enough to go to the semi-finals in the California women's championship. That shows what kind of a golfer she is.

Now she is back in the east of playing in the big tennis championships—playing, mind you, just about as well as ever.

## PAUL BERLENBACH TO MEET KELLY

Expect Thrilling Contest When These Heavy Hitters Meet.

Paul Berlenbach and Joe "Hambone" Kelly will meet at Braves Field, Boston, on the evening of Friday, Aug. 15. What should develop into one of the most thrilling contests in years, rivaled perhaps only by the sensational bout between Johnny Wilson and Jack McAuliffe recently, has been finally arranged by Matchmaker Goodwin of the Suffolk A. C.

Berlenbach, the New York fighter, the outstanding figure of the boxing world, and his record for successive knockouts is remarkable. Not devoid of boxing skill, he is essentially a slugger and probably the hardest hitter of his weight in the world. He can easily make the middleweight limit, but at catchweights, which means that they will both weigh in the neighborhood of 165 pounds.

Because of his penchant for stopping his opponents in a short order, Berlenbach, who was a wrestler before he took up boxing, has been styled "Fighting Paul" by New York critics.

"Hambone" Kelly's hitting powers are too well known to require comment. The South Boston southpaw is a knockout extraordinary, capable of administering a sleep-producing punch with either hand. When Kelly is in condition—and he has been conditioning himself for weeks at Bayville, on Cape Cod—he is one of the most dangerous members of his class. He is the only man who stopped Wolf Larsen, since the latter has been performing in Boston rings.

Don Hickey, veteran boxing instructor of the New York A. C., Berlenbach's manager, demanded \$10,000 as a fee for the fight, but Kelly, who has been a contender for half that amount, but for Kelly we must have \$10,000. He is too hard a hitter and too ring wise to take chances with anything. But after more than two weeks of parleying, Matchmaker Goodwin succeeded in clinching the match.
