

Dr. Cameron Gives Halifax Club an "Illustrated" Lecture on the Esquimaux.

Civilized races today were losing their teeth because they were forgetting how to chew, and palates were shrinking. He pointed out that the Esquimau had the finest intellectual forehead in the world, the specimen in question being particularly expansive.

Dr. Cameron next spoke of the days when Nova Scotia was completely covered by a great ice sheet or glacier, pointing out that ample proof of that could be seen in the heavy striations in the slate rock at Point Pleasant Park caused by the scraping of the ice.

It was along glacier edges that the Esquimau had hunted with their rude weapons of stone. Studying the Esquimaux brought one face to face with the past, for they were the type corresponding to the men of the stone age before metals were discovered.







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
