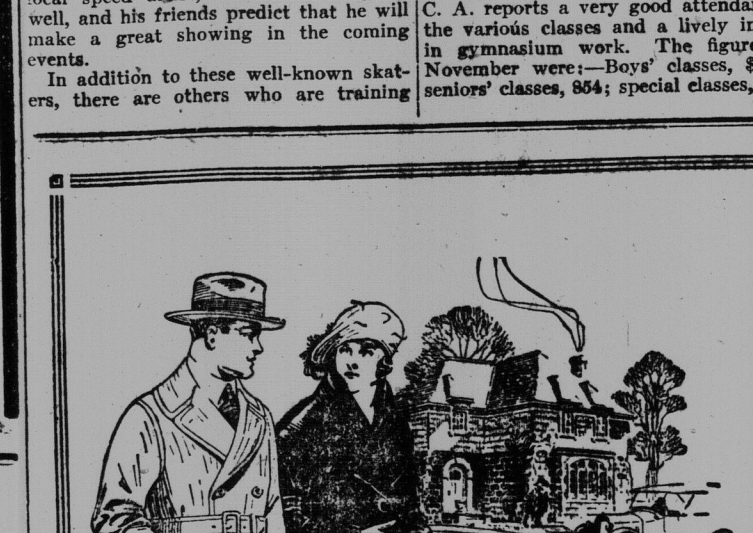
LOCAL SPEEDERS ARE GOING WELL ON LILY LAKE
