

## Camp Folk at Loch Lomond Take up Case With Health Board

Discuss Situation and Ask that Privileges be Continued Pending Investigation—Some Phases of Question—Another Meeting on Friday.

The grave matter of the city's water supply and its purity was further discussed in the Board of Health offices this forenoon, when a delegation of residents, mostly summer cottagers and fishing camp owners having domiciles along the shores of Loch Lomond, of community interest none of the fishermen were heard by the board. These gentlemen, who were introduced by Struan Robertson, wanted to know why their boating, fishing and other privileges were being prohibited on Loch Lomond when there did not seem to be any direct proof that their lake was the source of pollution disclosed by Dr. H. L. Abramson's recent tests.

H. R. McLellan was the chief spokesman for the party, which included A. Fred, deForest, James Crane, Heber Keith, James H. Pullen, E. A. Goodwin, George Kane, F. J. McInerney, Gabriel Sinibaldi, J. H. Armstrong, John H. Vaughan, B. C. Gilmore, and others. He said that it was not the purpose of the delegation to question the action of the Board of Health in making a thorough and far-reaching investigation of the causes for the sudden pollution of the city water, but to make a complete prohibition of pleasure on the waters be demanded. The delegation would like to know why it was determined that the pollution was from Loch Lomond, furthermore what constituted pollution and so forth.

It would be unthinkable, inhuman, Mr. McLellan said, to assume that these lake-dwellers would knowingly and deliberately pollute the drinking water that even they themselves had to use to make a complete prohibition of pleasure on the waters be demanded. The delegation would like to know why it was determined that the pollution was from Loch Lomond, furthermore what constituted pollution and so forth.

Mr. McLellan said that he felt sure the contamination was due to dead fish; in all probability this had been caused in the screen at the intake, Lake Latimer. He had known as many as a hundred of these fish to be taken from this trap at one time. He questioned Commissioner Jones, who was present, if there were not cels in the pipes at times.

The commissioner said it was true that one had been seen from the ferry building pipes recently.

Continuing, Mr. McLellan repeated the opinion of the bacteriologist at the time of a drowning in Loch Lomond, when strenuous and expensive efforts were being made to recover the body. He had been told that "three thousand dead bodies would not pollute such a large body of water."

However, the speaker was not going to stand for the truth of this assertion or

There was practically no change in the street car situation this morning. The N. B. Power Co. had five men cars operating on the main line on regular schedule, but very few passengers were carried. The former employees held their regular meeting this morning, nothing outside of routine business was transacted.

Percy W. Thomson, manager of the N. B. Power Co. said today that the present arrangement of street car service would be continued for a few days and that other cars would gradually be added. He said that it was the company's intention to give employment to as many local people as possible, before bringing in help from outside points. All the cars in operation this morning carried student workmen in addition to the regular operators. Mr. Thomson said that some of the former employees had come back to work today in departments other than the street car company.

John Thornton, commissioner of public safety, told a Times reporter this morning that he had started an investigation into a charge made yesterday that three policemen had looked on while a crowd interfered with the operation of street cars in Brussels street yesterday. He said that his department was not prepared to make any statement until it had been proved that the reports were true, but he was continuing the investigation.

Travis D. Harris, president of the men's union, said after the regular meeting this morning, that there was no change today so far as the men were concerned. He said that further plans were being made for the starting of a jitney service.

Following a conference with the leaders of the street car men's union on Saturday, Hon. Dr. W. F. Roberts, minister of health in the provincial government, was accompanied by R. T. Hayes and W. E. Scully, members of the New Brunswick legislature for the city of St. John, who were on duty upon Percy W. Thomson, manager of the New Brunswick Power Co., at noon today to ascertain if there was anything that could be done to clear up the present situation. Dr. Roberts said after the meeting that Mr. Thomson had informed the delegation that he had given the union an opportunity for recognition of the company in the order in which they applied.

The Times had been approached by an observing citizen with the theory that if there is proven to be contamination from the Loch Lomond supply, it might very possibly be due to the surface water of the lake which sluices through at the lower extremity, leaving the heavier and more turbid water at the top. Mr. Thomson said that the water practically untouched. If there should be any pollution of the water by garbage, the surface water would naturally float through the gate first and completely. The remedy for this would be further dredging upon the main body by more deeply laid pipes, etc., projecting further into the lake.

## RED VICAR CAUSES COMMOTION IN A QUIET VILLAGE

There have been sensational developments at the little Essex (Eng.) village of Thaxted, where the Socialist vicar, Rev. Conrad Noel, recently attracted public attention to this remote corner of East Anglia by displaying at his church the banner of Sinn Fein and the red flag of revolution.

The doctrines preached by the vicar and his extraordinary conduct have given deep offence to the loyal parishioners of the majority of the ladies of the congregation. There is said to be a boom in the porch of the church. Whether this is due to the vicar's preaching or to the fact that the vicar is a member of the church, is not known. The next move was made a few days later by a party of twenty-six members of the Cambridge University, who arrived in motor cars, removed both flags and made a strong and effective protest against this scandal in the church.
